




What is Channels of Hope for Ebola?

The Channels of Hope (CoH) model is a World Vision (WV) methodology that mobilises faith leaders to respond to development issues in their immediate environments. In response to the Ebola crises, WV applied years of experience and developed a curriculum focused specifically on Ebola.

This curricula draws on a range of material including sacred scriptures, scientific information and messages, case studies, personal experience and interactive activities to remove religious and social barriers that result in the continued spread of Ebola. It also addresses the stigma and the psychosocial and spiritual challenges that affected individuals face. The programme fully equips faith leaders



to promote accurate and responsible messages about Ebola and helps them to respond with compassion and care for affected people.

Why Channels of Hope for Ebola?

Faith leaders are amongst the most influential members in a community. They wield considerable influence over culture and what actions are prescribed or prohibited in their communities. With proper information and insight, faith leaders can be powerful messengers and change agents who play a significant role as part of a health and psychosocial care system in a communities. Their beliefs, values, role modelling and weekly messages can inspire entire communities to care for and love one another and deconstruct barriers to good health in their communities.



Faith Leaders share stories from their personal experience with Ebola and how it has impacted their lives and communities.

Unfortunately, faith leaders and faith communities often lack necessary skills and information to engage in a helpful way on health issues. In fact, they can drive wrong information or promote religious practices that continue to spread the disease.

CoH originally equipped faith leaders to overcome their silence on and judgment of HIV and AIDS, and to help others do the same. After successfully catalysing hundreds of thousands of faith leaders, WV field staff and partners saw the potential to apply CoH to other areas. WV subsequently developed CoH for Gender, Maternal, Newborn and Child Health, and Child Protection were developed. When Ebola began to spread in Sierra Leone, faith leaders who had previously been exposed to

CoH for other areas began to mobilise; they realised that they had a moral obligation to respond. Impromptu workshops led WV to create full content for workshops to ensure faith leaders have supporting scriptural and accurate scientific information to inform and care for their communities.

Use in other groups

The CoH programme has been successfully adapted for various ecumenical Christian and Muslim contexts. It has also been used effectively with various non-faith groups including teachers, community leaders and youth. In such cases, the faith-specific content can be omitted, however the sustainability of the programme relies heavily on the long-term commitment of faith leaders to their communities; this vital component is not always present in the case of non-faith groups.





Key CoH-Ebola content

CoH for Ebola establishes personal relevancy for faith leaders through exploring faith texts and history to motivate their response. The curricula also shares relevant health messages and connects faith leaders to community partners, information and planning tools to effectively combat Ebola and provide support and care for those affected by the disease.
