


### Key messages

- Overall situation:** The humanitarian situation in Somalia remains complex with acute humanitarian needs across the regions. Pockets of drought have resulted in complete food failure in some areas and food insecurity in others. Whilst in other areas, rainfall caused flash flooding resulting in temporal displacement and destruction of homes.
- In June, the Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and Emergency Relief Coordinator Mark Lowcock allocated US\$45 million from the Central Emergency Response Fund (CERF) to immediately scale up food and nutrition assistance, safe water provision, livelihoods protection, and other urgent humanitarian support to drought-affected people across parts of Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya who are facing acute food problems following another season of failed rains.
- Malnutrition:** Over a million children in Somalia are expected to be acutely malnourished in the next 12 months, including 138,200 who will be severely malnourished and in need of life-saving assistance. The ongoing drought and other shocks have left communities with little to no resources to fall back on - hence the importance of investing in resilience.
- Humanitarian needs in Somalia continue to persist:** Millions of Somalis are vulnerable and likely to face starvation, pushing an even greater number of people into reliance on humanitarian assistance.
- Urgent scaling up of humanitarian assistance is required:** Without adequate and timely funding, World Vision will not be able to respond to the continuous nutrition crisis or to reach the most vulnerable children in need of health, education, protection and WASH services. Additional funding will help to provide critical services to the drought affected areas and the internally displaced persons facing the spread of diseases.




### Gaps and needs

### Response highlights



#### WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

- 51,433 people including 10,355 children benefited from various WASH activities including hygiene awareness training, provision of hygiene kits and P&G water sachets in South West State, Jubaland, Puntland and Somaliland.
- 40 VIP latrines were completed in South West State, serving 1,441 beneficiaries from 205 households.
- In Somaliland, 273 students were trained on Children Hygiene and Sanitation Transformation (CHAST) approach.
- In Puntland, World Vision distributed Proctor & Gamble water treatment sachets to 4,000 households in Jarriban and Burtinle Districts.



#### HEALTH

- 45,276 people received various health services including out-patient, antenatal, immunization and health education in health centres and mobile clinics supported by World Vision.
- In South West State and Jubaland, a total of 22,645 community members received medical consultation services from health facilities supported by World Vision.
- In Puntland, 1,053 people participated in health education, 8,948 people received out-patient treatment and 6,062 children were immunized in World Vision health facilities.



#### EDUCATION

- 448 students and teachers benefited from education interventions in South West State, Puntland and Somaliland.
- In South West State, 154 (74 M, 80 F) students continued undertaking Institute-based technical vocational training in tailoring, computer studies, mobile repairing, beauty salon and tie and dye.
- In Somaliland, 30 students were enrolled into the Technical and Vocational Education Training (TVET) programme.
- In Puntland, 100 teachers were supported with incentives. Separately, 62 Community Education Committee members (CEC) from 8 villages were formed and trained on their roles and responsibilities according to the approved Ministry of Education training manual.



#### FOOD SECURITY & LIVELIHOODS

- 148,667 people in South West State, Jubaland, Puntland and Somaliland benefitted from food security and livelihoods interventions during the month of June. Of these, 17,852 were children.
- In Somaliland, 66,828 beneficiaries were supported with food vouchers.
- In South West State, 735 people had their 9,755 heads of livestock treated against internal and external parasites and infections.
- In Puntland, 1,353 households benefitted from e-vouchers in Dangorayo, Eyl, Godobjiraan and Garowe Districts.



#### NUTRITION

- 59,614 people including 45,890 children were screened and treated of Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) and Moderate Acute Malnutrition (MAM) in South West State and Puntland.
- In South West State, 5,460 children under-5 years were screened for malnutrition. 7 children were referred to Bay regional hospital stabilization centre for further treatment.
- In Puntland, 3,583 children and 3,748 Pregnant and Lactating Women (PLW) were screened for malnutrition in World Vision health facilities and 435 were found to have MAM and 231 SAM.



#### PROTECTION

- 8,878 people including 3,870 children benefited from protection interventions in South West State, Somaliland and Jubaland.
- In Somaliland, WV supported commemoration of the African child, an event that benefitted 80 participants. Also, Gender-Based Violence (GBV) committees were established and trained benefitting 193 people.
- In Puntland, education sessions on clinical management of rape (CMR) protocols, clinical care for sexual assault survivors as well as management of referral systems benefited 6 female health care providers from 6 primary health units.




EAST AFRICA CHILDREN'S CRISIS SITUATION REPORT | JUNE 1 - JUNE 30, 2019


