


### Key messages

- Overall situation: Mild to moderate drought conditions are imminent in many parts of Somalia due to the 2018 insufficient deyr rains and delayed onset of Gu rains. The rainfall amounts recorded so far are significantly below normal, with poor temporal and spatial distribution. More rains are required to reverse the damage that has been caused by the poor rains. With no significant rains foreseen until the end of the season, the existing drought situation may deteriorate further and affect all livelihoods that are rain depended.
- Food Security is expected to continue deteriorating. Approximately 1.7 million people are now estimated to be in Crisis (IPC Phase 3) and Emergency (IPC Phase 4) between April and June 2019, an increase of 10 percent from the previous projection of 1.55 million for February-June 2019. The number of people classified as Stressed (IPC Phase 2) remains 3.4 million. Declining livestock body conditions, limited livestock saleability, and rising food prices are expected to constrain household food access and urgent scale-up of humanitarian food assistance is needed to help vulnerable people across the country.
- Urgent scaling up of humanitarian assistance is required. Without adequate and timely funding, World Vision will not be able to respond to the continuous nutrition crisis or to reach the most vulnerable children in need of health, education, protection and WASH services. Additional funding will help to provide critical services to the drought affected areas and the internally displaced persons facing the spread of diseases.
- Some areas in the North have experienced floods including Nugaal, Karkaar, Sanaag /Haylaan and Sool regions. This might increase the prevalence of waterborne disease. There is urgent need for clean water, hygiene facilities and food assistance as well as Non-Food Items including plastic sheets, tents and mosquito nets for communities in Nugaal region that have been affected by floods.



- Humanitarian needs in Somalia continue to persist. Millions of Somalis are vulnerable and likely to face starvation, pushing an even greater number of people into reliance on humanitarian assistance. Rising food prices have decreased household purchasing power and reduced food access among the most vulnerable.

### Response highlights



#### WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

- 93,344 people including 23,017 children benefited from various WASH activities including hygiene awareness training, provision of hygiene kits and P&G water sachets in South West State, Jubaland, Puntland and Somaliland.
- In South West State, construction of 40 VIP latrines in the program areas targeting 2,490 households with 14,940 people was completed.
- In Somaliland, 273 students were trained on Children Hygiene and Sanitation Transformation (CHAST) approach.
- In Puntland, World Vision distributed P&G water treatment sachets to 6,366 households.



#### HEALTH

- 60,515 people received various health services including out-patient, antenatal, immunization and health education in health centres and mobile clinics supported by World Vision.
- In South West State and Jubaland, a total of 14,619 community members received medical consultation services from health facilities supported by World Vision.
- In Somaliland, World Vision supported 26 health facilities and 12 mobile teams with staffing, medical and nutrition supplies benefiting 7,520 people and 15,505 children.



#### EDUCATION

- 968 students and teachers benefited from education interventions in South West State, Puntland and Somaliland.
- In South West State, 154 students continued undertaking Institute-based technical vocational training in tailoring, computer studies, mobile repairing, beauty salon and Tie and Dye.
- In Somaliland, 110 TVET students continued with their studies.
- In Puntland, 100 teachers have been supported with incentives and 56 teachers from 11 World Vision supported schools have been trained on school information management.



#### FOOD SECURITY & LIVELIHOODS

- 154,204 people in South West State, Jubaland, Puntland and Somaliland benefitted from food security and livelihoods interventions during the month of May. Of these, 13,246 were children.
- In Somaliland, 66,828 beneficiaries in four districts were supported with food vouchers.
- In South West State, 674 people (207Female, 467Male) had their 8,180 heads of livestock treated against internal and external parasites and infection.
- In Puntland, 1,346 Households benefitted from e-voucher distribution.



#### NUTRITION

- 36,881 people including 21,402 children were screened and treated with Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) and Moderate Acute Malnutrition (MAM) in South West State and Puntland.
- In Southwest State, 4675 children under-5 years were screened for malnutrition. Also, 2,770 pregnant and lactating mothers were screened for malnutrition and 951 were found to be malnourished and treated.
- In Puntland, 3,668 children were screened for malnutrition in World Vision health facilities.




#### PROTECTION

- 1,243 people including 551 children benefited from protection interventions in South West State, Somaliland and Jubaland.
- In South West State, World Vision in collaboration with Catholic Relief Services concluded the referral pathway for both legal services and safe house services for survivors of violence in Baidoa.
- In Somaliland, 25 members from WASH and Protection committees in Baki and Lughaya benefitted from education sessions on protection.
- In Puntland, education sessions on child protection and Gender-Based Violence benefited 64 people




EAST AFRICA CHILDREN'S CRISIS SITUATION REPORT | MAY 1 - MAY 31, 2019
