

Key messages

- Newly arriving South Sudanese and Congolese refugees: Despite the reduction in funding, Uganda is projected to receive an additional 155, 000 new arrivals, mainly from South Sudan and DRC, by the end of 2019 bringing the population to over 1.4 million persons of concern. In the month of July alone, 944 people of concern were received from South Sudan, the majority of these are women and children. While 6,490 Congolese refugees were received from DRC in the South West.
- Partnering for peace: World Vision Korea is funding a
 peacebuilding program that is empowering children as
 peacebuilders. So far, 280 children from 8 peace clubs
 in Arua are promoting peace within the settlement
 and host community. They do this through dance and
 drama and airing peace messages on local radio stations.
 The aim is to promote peaceful coexistence and social
 cohesion.
- Strengthening protection capacity: As a way of building a stronger protection ring around children in their communities, World Vision has engaged and strengthened the capacity of community protection structures to protect children. These include child protection committees, Refugee welfare councils, and foster parents. Child Protection related activities and interventions reached a total of 48,943 children in West Nile.
- Promoting a saving culture: World Vision with funding from the Austria Development Agency has formed 100 new savings and development clusters comprising of 2,500 members from the host and refugee community in Omugo Sub County. The members have been trained and provided with start-up kits. The aim is to promote household income and enterprise.

Gaps and needs

- Multi-year funding: There is need for longer term funding in all sectors to sustain project interventions as well as increase project target and scope for greater impact.
- Early Childhood Education: Existing ECD centres within the settlements continue to experience great numbers of pupils leading to congestion. There is also a high teacher pupil ratio and a strain on WASH facilities. In the host community, ECD centres are literally non-existent leading to high numbers of out of school children



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Response highlights



FOOD SECURITY & LIVELIHOODS

• 21,407 refugees and members of the hosting community gained from improved farming technologies, savings and loan associations as well as cash-based assistance to help improve resilience at household level.



FOOD ASSISTANCE

• World Vision's food assistance programme assisted 465,586 South Sudanese and Congolese (DRC) refugees living in Imvepi, Bidibidi, Omugo, Kyaka II and Kyangwali Settlements. 8,116.338 metric tonnes of food were distributed in July.



CHILD PROTECTION

In July, 48,943 children attended World Vision's Child Friendly Spaces, gaining from educational and psychosocial support.



SHELTER & NON FOOD ITEMS (NFIs)

- 107,316 South Sudanese refugees of whom 42,926 were children in Omugo and Imvepi settlements were provided with an essential relief package. The package contained household kits including kitchen sets, blankets, soap, plastic basin, water container, sleeping mat, mosquito nets, and solar light. Other items were plastic sheets, ropes, panga, hoes, sickle, and sanitary kits-and sanitary pads and underwear.
- Reception Centre Management: A total of 944 refugees were received from South Sudan. World Vision manages the reception centres in Omugo, Imvepi and Ocea refugee settlements in Arua district, Bidibidi and Ariwa in Yumbe district in partnership with the UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR) and Office of the Prime Minister (OPM). World Vision provides new arrivals with hot meals, overnight shelter facilities, hygiene and sanitation facilities, as well as providing temporary foster care to unaccompanied children and thereafter referring these cases to various partners for further assistance. In July, our services at the reception centres in west Nile reached 107,316 people.


