World Vision

Key messages

- Newly arriving South Sudanese and Congolese refugees: Despite the reduction in funding, Uganda is projected to receive an additional 155,000 new arrivals, mainly from South Sudan and DRC, by the end of 2019 bringing the population to over 1.4 million persons of concern. In the month of August alone, 1151 people of concern were received from South Sudan, majority of these are women and children. While 8,801 Congolese refugees were received from DRC in the South West (Kyaka II and Kyangwali).
- Disabled but not unable: World Vision with funding from Ministry of Foreign Affairs Finland is supporting 250 households with disabilities to establish gardens to meet their nutrition needs as well as earn some income. The project further seeks to address barriers affecting persons with various impairments in accessing Water and Sanitation facilities.
- **Empowered to build peace:** Wold Vision is empowering children as peace ambassadors and advocates for improvement in service delivery. In August, 15, peace clubs with 30 members each were represented in a children's parliament that brought together government officials, stakeholders, organisations and UN agencies to listen to issues affecting children. The proceedings of the program were recorded and are being aired weekly on local radio stations to increase reach.
- Environmental protection: World Vision used farmer managed natural regeneration (FMNR) approach to promote environmental restoration and protection of natural tree species in Bidibidi, Omugo and Imvepi Settlements, World Vision trained 83 extension staff from 8 District Local Governments and partners on the FMNR approach.





Gaps and needs

- Declined funding: The Refugee Agency, plans to scale down operations over funding in Uganda. This will affect the livelihoods of refugees who have been receiving planting materials for food production and attending skills training courses. The institution has so far only raised 20% of the \$500m budget for refugee response for 2019.
- Multi-year funding: There is need for longer term funding especially under environmental protection. Some of the interventions are not short terms and require sustainable funding at least for one year.

Response highlights



FOOD SECURITY & LIVELIHOODS

• 20,625 refugees and members of the hosting community gained from improved farming technologies, savings and loan associations as well as cash-based assistance to help improve resilience at household level.

FOOD ASSISTANCE

• Reached 483,448 South Sudanese and Congolese (DRC) refugees living in Imvepi, Bidibidi, Omugo, Kyaka II and Kyangwali Settlements. 6,812.71 metric tonnes of food were distributed in August.



CHILD PROTECTION

48,362 children attended World Vision's Child Friendly Spaces, gaining from educational and psychosocial support.



SHELTER & NON FOOD ITEMS (NFIs)

- 123.997 of which 80.598 are children South Sudanese refugees in Omugo and Imvepi settlements were provided with an essential relief package containing household kits such as (kitchen sets, blankets, soap, plastic basin, water container, sleeping mat, mosquito nets, and solar light). Other items were plastic sheets, ropes, panga, hoes, sickle, and sanitary kits-and sanitary pads and underwear).
- Reception Centre Management: A total of 1151 refugees were received from South Sudan.World Vision manages the reception centres in Omugo, Imvepi and Ocea refugee settlements in Arua district, Bidibidi and Ariwa in Yumbe district in partnership with the UN Refugee Agency (UNHCR) and Office of the Prime Minister (OPM). World Vision provides new arrivals with hot meals, overnight shelter facilities, hygiene and sanitation facilities, as well as providing temporary foster care to unaccompanied children and thereafter referring these cases to various partners for further assistance.
