ABOUT THE GRADUATE **INTERNSHIP** PROGRAMME (GRIP)







I also gained a lot from the numerous spiritual reading materials that were discussed during morning devotions. I leave GRIP knowing that good leaders take initiative and make things happen!







ACHIEVING CAREER DEVELOPMENT GOALS


