Active Special Projects

Cocoa Life Project (2008 to date)

The Cocoa Life Project funded by Mondelez International seeks to empower individuals and households in cocoa growing areas through the promotion of sustainable livelihood interventions, capacity development and provision of infrastructure. The project collaborates with partners such as the Department of Agriculture, Department of Co-operatives, Ghana Cocoa Board, Abantu for Development and UNDP in providing extension services, education on sustainable agronomic and environmental practices, gender equity, citizen empowerment and combating child labour.



- Started in 59 communities in the Fanteakwa and Mpohor Wassa East Districts in 2008
- Currently in 230 communities in five districts (Bia, Juaboso, Ahafo Ano North, Sekyere East, Awutu Senya and Wassa East)



 38 Farmer-Based Organisations with over 2,300 members registered as cooperatives facilitate to obtain fair trade certification

Farmer Managed Natural Regeneration (FMNR) Phase I (2009-2011), FMNR Phase II (2012-2017) and FMNR Phase III (2017-Date):

The FMNR initiative is helping to improve the livelihoods and resilience of rural farming communities, as well as increase food yields through tree preservation and improved soil quality and addressing issues of hunger among local households. The FMNR concept also gives equal opportunities for participation of women in order to boost their knowledge in natural resource management, advocacy and decision-making.

FMNR Phase 1 Evaluation (2015)

- 77.9% of farmers practicing FMNR
- 302.8 hectares of degraded communal
- 907 average tree density per hectare in project area

FMNR Phase II Evaluation Report (2018)

- 28 project communities
- 279 hectares of communal land under tree cover
- 800 hectares more on individual farmlands land restored

Reversing Land Degradation in Africa by Scaling-up Ever-Green Agriculture funded by European Commission(EU)- (2019-2022):

The Reversing Land Degradation in Africa by Scaling-up Ever-Green Agriculture is being implemented in the Bawku West, Garu and Mion Districts of the Upper East Region of Ghana in collaboration with Catholic Relieve Services. The project started in 2018 with funding from the European Commission (EU.The overall goal is to improve livelihoods, food security and resilience to climate change by smallholder farmers in Africa and restore ecosystem services by scaling-up the practices of evergreen agriculture.
