#### **KEY RESPONSE MESSAGES**

- > Political, human rights and socio-economic developments in Venezuela continue to lead to the exodus of millions of refugees and migrants—more than 5.4 million as of Dec. 5, 2020. More than 110,000 Venezuelans have opted to return to the country during the pandemic, despite border restrictions and increased risks.
- > The COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in Venezuelans migrating through unauthorized border crossings. Limitated access to health services, including prevention and care for COVID-19; eviction; domestic violence; and difficulties maintaining and generating income lead to more social and economic problems. Xenophobia and stigmatization also are prevalent among host communities. Governments need to ensure humanitarian organizations have access to communities, migrants and refugees to provide basic assistance alongside the governments.
- > The primary protection needs for Venezuelan migrants: Immigration Regularization, Documentation, Prevention of evictions, and birth registration. Regarding GBV survivors: Psychosocial support for survivors, case management, legal assistance, and practical in-kind assistance, livelihoods for survivors. About special services: Specialized services for survivors, psychosocial support, family reunification, and alternative care
- > Promising political developments include: Thirteen countries confirmed their commitment, through the Quito Process, to safe, organized, and regular migration and international protection for Venezuelan refugees. They also reaffirmed the need for international cooperation to contribute to the countries' efforts in caring for Venezuelan migrants and refugees. Regionally, all actors agree that the budget need is a central challenge in the region; the RMRP has a 55% budget gap, as of December 10, 2020.
- > World Vision's 7-country response aims to raise US\$58 million to reach 700,000 people from January 2020 through December 2022.

#### **COUNTRY OVERVIEWS**

- **Bolivia**: World Vision Bolivia, in coordination with partner organizations, has been supporting Venezuelan migrant families and refugee applicants who remain in the cities of La Paz and El Alto.
- > Brazil: The "Operação Acolhida" (name of the official government response program) still operates in Boa Vista, Pacaraima and Manaus city, where the priorities are: border control, humanitarian assistance and ressetlement process. Last official information from government sources shows that there are 262,475 Venezuelans in Brazil. They each live with a certain level of social vulnerability. Of the total Venezuelans that have migrated, 102.504 of them have requested refugee status in Brazil.
- > Chile: COVID-19 has exacerbated the risks, threats, and vulnerabilities faced by migrant and refugee families. They can be indicated as the people most affected by the pandemic, due to the lack of social protections and due to loss of income from work in informal sectors. We have also evidenced the overcrowding and the precarious living conditions in which they live, which includes evictions from homes due to inability to pay rent. Currently, Venezuelans represent the largest migrant group in the country, totalingmore than 457,000 people.

- > Colombia: Colombia has received the most Venezuelan migrants and refugees of any country in 2020. The country currently hosts more than 1.7 million Venezuelans, of which about 55% live with irregular status. In addition, approximately 845,000 Colombians have returned, been repatriated or have dual nationality. The pandemic has deeply affected refugees' and migrants' living conditions and exacerbated their needs. The loss of income and the restrictions on informal work have reduced access to basic goods and services for thousands of Venezuelan families. Therefore humanitarian support remains vital to help people in various aspects of life.
- **Ecuador**: The country has gradually opened up since September and refugee and migrant livelihoods remain a priority. Several partners have reactivated some programs by strengthening capacities for employment and entrepreneurship, as well as financial support for economic inclusion. Food-security assistance continues to expand, while several strategies have been registered for the payment of rents and the opening of temporary shelters in July and August. The pandemic also has widened the gap in access to education for Venezuelan children.
- **Peru**: During the coronavirus pandemic, World Vision Peru has continued working to address needs of the most vulnerable migrant and refugees, including interventions in the following areas: Multipurpose cash; Non-Food Items, providing cleaning kits to feeding centers, and integration, through the USAID-funded project that helps doctors get their certification to practice in the country. The strategies are taking into account the current pandemic situation in which we live and seek to reduce the levels of vulnerability of the migrant population.
- **Venezuela:** The Venezuelan economy is still in a downward spiral, mostly because output from the country's oil industry continues to decrease. Across the country, the dollar has now replaced the Bolivar as the main currency. The regional spillover of Venezuela's political conflict and economic collapse has caused ties between Colombia and Venezuela, to fray as well, amid border closures, a migrant exodus and a rapid increase of humanitarian needs all across the country.

#### **COUNTRY OVERVIEW**

#### **KEY MESSAGES**

- > Since the opening of the economy in September of this year, re-entries from Venezuela have increased through informal passages to some territories such as Norte de Santander, Santander and Arauca. According to UNHCR, an average of 80-100 Venezuelans enter the Arauca and 300 to Cúcuta daily. The irregular status of migrants and the presence of armed groups increase the exposure of refugees and migrants to protection risks during border crossings and transit through the country.
- > Once the border opens, the government expects the number of Venezuelans who settle in the country could reach 2 million. This scenario, together with the consequences of the health emergency, exponentially, increases the number of people in need. This highlights the need for continued support from different humanitarian actors.
- > Needs among Venezuelan households include: personal protection equipment, personal hygiene kits, support for testing (strengthening of health laboratories), hospital supplies and equipment, access to clean water, hand washing and waste disposal facilities, housing support, family-planning alternatives and food. World Vision has addressed some of these needs with partners, but the humanitarian community must be able to assist the most vulnerable people.

#### **COUNTRY OVERVIEW**

#### **KEY MESSAGES**

World Vision Ecuador advocates the guarantee of the rights of migrant children and adolescents, separated or unaccompanied, by making four requests to the Ecuadorian State and its authorities:

- Include in public policies and actions to attend to the health emergency the large number of migrant and refugee children and adolescents;
- > Implement concrete and specific actions to protect your rights, from housing to your right to daily maintenance, prioritizing your family ties:
- Regularize their immigration status and grant the necessary administrative measures for this purpose, while their stay in the country lasts; and:
- > Avoid the eviction of migrant families from rental rooms for lack of payment and include families in situations of human mobility in the state's humanitarian care programs.



#### SECTOR HIGHLIGHTS



The USAID II project in November made the first cash transfer to 1,816 people, the second transfer to 1.261 peoble.



#### FOOD SECURITY/LIVELIHOODS

During the month of November, the USAID II project reached 860 beneficiaries in 17 soup kitchens in the regions of Tumbes (2), La Libertad (4) and Lima (11), delivering a total of 17100 rations. In relation to the accumulated goal between September and November, the project has reached 913 beneficiaries.



The protection team conducted a rapid needs assessment among 366 families in Tumbes. La Libertad. Lima and Tacna.

We identified 82 public and private institutions for protection services case referrals and our specialists developed guidelines and framework for new education and protection programming in those regions.

#### **COUNTRY OVERVIEW**

#### **KEY MESSAGES**

- The new Law on Migration and Foreigners is in its final phase of approval. It replaces the current law in force since 1975. This regulation creates, among other elements, the National Immigration Service and establishes 13 types of visas for temporary residence (including a family reunification visa and another for humanitarian reasons). It will also require that these visas be requested at the Chilean consulates abroad.
- > One of the groups most affected by the pandemic in the country has been people with irregular migration status. The pandemic has increased protection risks, especially among children. People in our programs who are in an irregular situation have not been able to access the cash transfer programs crucial to providing economic security to families in times of COVID-19.
- In the Tarapacá region, in the town of Huara, a border territory with Bolivia, during the last month there has been a sustained increase in people entering Chile through unauthorized passages. This unprecedented situation in the country has lead to the installation of spaces that offer shelter, clothing and food to migrants before transfering them to be tested for COVID-19 in health facilities in Iquique.

The women's entrepreneurship program continues to expand throughout the country. This innovative program works 100% remotely. In it, participants connect to online classes, receive personalized technical advice to develop or strengthen their businesses and receive a monetary contribution for the purchase of materials, supplies and tools that they receive directly at home.



#### CASH-BASED PROGRAMMING

With UNHCR, we deliver multi-purpose electronic coupons, allowing refugee and migrant families to access what they need most. The system works 100% digitally, which allows us to easily reach different cities throughout the country.



Specialized attention to extremely vulnerable migrants allowed us to strengthen the protection of families in Arica and Santiago. They receive psychological first aid and guidance on various topics to improve access to public services and minimize the need to resort to negative survival mechanisms.

#### **COUNTRY OVERVIEW**

#### **KEY MESSAGES**

- > After a 6-month interruption in the education cycle, Venezuelan children are facing the consequences of the stress and challenges caused by the lack of online resources and other mechanisms to continue learning at home. World Vision is supporting children with digital and physical tools to keep them motivated and active meanwhile they wait for classes to start up again.
- > As part of the economic recovery, job opportunities are key for Venezuelans' recovery and integration. World Vision is actively advocating with employers to maintain and reinforce migrant-friendly employment policies during the pandemic.
- > Venezuelan Women still suffer the worst consequences of the pandemic, mainly those who are facing lack of household income. World Vision, in partnership with IOM, is working to support 1,200 women with financial education and Cash-Based Interventions to support their financial recovery.
