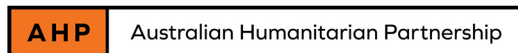

FACTS

- Timor-Leste's tropical climate is heavily influenced by the West Pacific Monsoon and its mountainous climate.
- Timor-Leste's climate is strongly impacted by the El Niño Southern Oscillation which can vary the inter-annual quantity of rainfall by up to 50% and affect the timing of peak annual rainfall. In combination with increased growing season temperatures, this is likely to reduce the yields of Timor-Leste's agricultural production which is the livelihoods of 70% of population.



KEY INTERVENTIONS

Livelihoods & resilience

Builds economically sustainable and resilient households by establishing village-based savings and loan schemes and training producers and farmers to improve their crops, overcome market barriers, and increase profits

Farmer-managed natural regeneration

Help communities adapt to climate change through a land restoration technique that restores trees and shrubs from living stumps and roots in degraded forest areas. By carefully pruning new stems sprouting from tree stumps, farmers bring new life to the seemingly barren land.

AHP COVID-19 response project

Support communities to increase food security and income by planting superfoods while reinforcing their awareness, and thus prevention, of COVID-19 outbreak and gender-based violence
