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orld Vision Tanzania in collaboration with District Councils, Communities, Parents and Care givers contributed to improved quality and equitable access to basic education for 394,871 boys and 445,152 girls including Most Vulnerable Children. In this financial year, our focus has been improving children access to quality Early Childhood Development Education and Pre-primary Education. 44% of children in our area are able to read, write and counting.

In partnership with the government and communities, we have constructed 19 classrooms, 3 teachers' houses. We have procured 580 desks and 532 latrine stances for Pre and Primary schools in different regions. In strengthening the quality of Early Childhood Development Education (ECDE) 912 Teachers trained on ECDE curriculum and teaching methodologies.

In promoting out of school literacy activities, 32 reading clubs were established this year, making it a total of 392 throughout the country benefiting 27,024 children. 1,612 (89%) reading community facilitators oriented to manage these camps. 14,125 (69%) parents trained to support their children literacy development at home. 477,447 story books were distributed in all reading camps for out of school literacy activities during weekends.

Child Protection, Advocacy & Justice for Children



e have engaged 208 Village Junior Councils through, "It Take a World to End Early Marriage" campaign in protecting, preventing and responded to abuse, neglect, exploitation, and other forms of violence against children especially the most vulnerable. I 17 village councils included end child marriage as an agenda in their meetings. 276 Faith Leaders empowered and capacitated in advocating for ending child marriage and pregnancies. We have collaborated with Tanzania Ending Child Marriage Network and shared a joint statement to stress implementation of Court Ruling over Marriage Act of 1971. We have supported 2,968 children to obtain birth registration. 7,120 adult members were trained on Child and Adult safeguarding issues to ensure children are protected from all harms of their wellbeing. Engaged 18-radio stations to amplified Child protection messages through key government and faith leaders in 13 regions that we operate



prior and during the Day of African Child.

Our Child and Protection Policy Training has been conducted to 94 staff, 21 AP committee members and 20 interns to ensure protection to children and adult beneficiary from harm caused by the work and activities conducted by WVT staff and affiliates. 13 cases of sexual violence to children, and sponsor complains and road traffic incident.

164 adolescent groups have established to prevent and respond to abuse, neglect, exploitation and other forms of violence against children. Trained 2,029 members of Women and Children Protection village committees on issues around protection of girls against child marriage and pregnancy during lockdown period.

Faith & Development

orld Vision collaborated with the Ministry of Health, Community Development, Gender, Elderly and Children (MHCDGEC) to engage faith leaders on the National Day of Prayer in responding to COVID 19 at Karimjee with Prime Minister Hon. Kassim Majaliwa, as guest of honor. We advocate for hope, comfort to those who are stigmatized and messaging what the ministry advocates against COVID19. We have engaged BAKWATA through the Council of Muslim Scholars in development and issued of Fatwa Statement on Child Marriage that was distributed to all Qadhi in Tanzania. The Fatwa directs Qadhi to protect interest of girls when dealing with marriage matters. The Fatwa was read by High Sheikh, Mufti of Tanzania Abdullah Zuberi.

Livelihood & Residence

e have equipped 5,274 farmers to become more productive and resilient through Climate Smart Agriculture to reduce poverty among the most vulnerable communities. Excavated and rehabilitated of 56 water pans that benefited direct 2,304 smallholder farmers in the dry season to increase horticultural productivity

4,448 individuals included children were trained on disaster risk reduction techniques and formed new 219 functional disaster preparedness committees.

96 new crop producers' groups were established with 1,759 farmers (53% Females) and new 117 new livestock keepers. Organized 78 producer groups to sell their products collectively. 514 farmers trained in Farm Managed Natural Resources and bee keeping.

We have established 586 new Saving for Transformation (S4T) groups reaching 13,478 new members (68% female). Cumulatively, World Vision Tanzania has formed 6,604 S4T groups with 154,632 members (70% are women) with total amount of US\$ 6.2 Million in the saving cycle.

The S4T group members have supported 17,276 Most Vulnerable Children through their own social fund by provided them with scholastic materials, food, health care, love and care.

US \$ 1.5 Million benefited 5,595 smallholder famers as loans from Vision Fund supported 16,381 children where we worked.





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HEALTH & NUTRITION

e have reached 206,282 pregnant women, mothers and caregivers. Trained 774 (72%) Community Health Workers to provide community maternal new-born care. We advocated for breastfeeding for 216,404 children with 6-23 months old. 5,072 new-borns received all 3 components of essential new born care.

448 pregnant women received a postreferral follow up visit by CHW at their households. 7,801 registered new-borns age 0-1 month from our interventions were attended more than four times antenatal services as recommended by MOHCDGEC. 6,661 pregnant mothers started ANC within the first 16 week.

232 nutrition support groups were formed and trained to complement the work done by the Community Health Workers and the health facilities in their community. 2,191 children participated in nutrition sessions and gained 400 g in the first one month through the positive deviance hearth approach.

To enhance increased availability of micronutrient supplements, diversified nutrient-dense foods 1,500,000 Oranged Freshed Sweet Potatoes vines procured and supplied to 14,560 Household, whereby 3,640 acres of land planted. I12 secondary multipliers farmers were registered and supplied with pre basic seed from TARI for quality declared seed production.

7 Oranged Freshed Sweet Potatoes primary seed nurseries were established in Shinyanga for supplying bulk vines for farmers during dry planting season.



Water, Sanitation & Hygiene (WASH)

44,621 households have been supported with sanitation facilities for clean hygiene.

85,420

households have been sensitized on importance of handwashing facilities.

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HIV/AIDS

Coached 5,280 boys committed into men to address issues of HIV/AIDS and sexual violence. Trained I, 660 (123%) youth peer educators on value-based life-skills and sexual and reproductive health in improving capacity of communities to prevent, care and support clients living with HIV & AIDS. 10,462 pregnant women accepted counselling, tested HIV and received their test results as a measure of preventing mother-to-child.



- I,988,244 people reached with preventive behaviour messaging and 7,848 IEC materials printed and distributed to different places.
- 522 faith leaders were engaged to disseminate preventive behaviour messages through their services and media engagement.
- 86 Caregivers provided with essential materials, including hand sanitizer, soap, masks and gloves.
- 836 masks, and 400 glove sets distributed to health facilities.
- I,742 hand-washing distributed to communities, health and educational facilities.
- We distributed Personal Protective Equipment (PPEs) to 4 regions.
- We distributed include; Megaphone, sanitizers and facial mask for self-protection to all 16 regions that World Vision Tanzania works.
- 533 CHWs trained and supported to provide communitybased services at community level.
- 402 disinfectant kits were distributed to 32 healthcare facilities.
- 3, 337 community members, parents and caregivers were trained on alternative learning to continue supporting their children (home school children).
- 220 teachers trained on supporting home learning to children during lockdown.
