

2022 IMPACT SNAPSHOT







In 2022, South Sudan's fragility continued to exacerbate as the country reeled from the increasing threats and impact of climate change and conflict, resulting to increased hunger, displacements, and outbreaks of diseases. All these affect children and communities in many parts of the country.




World Vision in South Sudan has remained steadfast on its commitment to deliver its promise — improve the lives of 3 million children by 2025 — as it pursued programs and projects focusing on emergency relief, recovery, and resilience.

Highlighted in this report are the gains World Vision has made in 2022, working with partners in supporting the well-being of children and communities, and the impact of our interventions in food security and livelihoods, health and nutrition, water, sanitation and hygiene, and education with the integration of protection, peacebuilding, and faith and development.

World Vision recognizes that it is mostly through multi-sectoral programming that the most vulnerable children can be given a holistic chance at thriving. Underlying all of World Vision's key interventions were peacebuilding, gender equality and social inclusion, and protection initiatives to enhance social cohesion of communities.











In 2022, World Vision South Sudan served more than 2.3 million people, including 1.3 million children. More than 2.1 million people were reached through various emergency response, food security and livelihood interventions. In collaboration with partners, particularly the World Food Programme, World Vision distributed 40,246 metric tons of food and US\$7.4 million in cash to over 1 million people in crisis. At least 819,648 children and 434,946 pregnant and lactating women received care and nutrition support.

Food Security, Livelihoods, and Climate action

More than 27,000 farmers completed extensive agriculture training programs, including the Climate Smart Agriculture, under World Vision's Food Security and Livelihoods program, supported by the Food and Agriculture Organization, the World Food Programme, and other partners. The training programs included knowledge sharing on good agricultural practices, establishment of demonstration farms where farmers could learn together, envision, test, and expand their business ideas.

These programs are outstanding examples of how collaboration and partnerships equip and empower communities into becoming more resilient and adaptive to human and natureinduced hazards and climate change impacts.



Health and Nutrition

At the core of World Vision South Sudan's interventions on health and nutrition are maternal and child health, specifically aimed at reducing, and eradicating, the prevalence of malnutrition and likelihood of preventable deaths. To achieve this, World Vision works closely and in partnership with the national and state ministries of health, country organizations, faith-based groups, and humanitarian and development organizations to strengthen health systems, infrastructures, supply chain, and information management.

IN FOCUS

Education gives hope to children affected by conflict, hunger, and flooding

Moses, 11, lost his parents at an early age and now lives with his elder sister. "We pay SSP 6000 (US\$12) per term with requirements. I stopped because I do do not want to add burden to my sister who is also struggling to make ends meet," he says. He works odd jobs in people's farmlands to earn some money for his other needs. His situation changed when he got educational support and now he is keen to excel in his studies to become a doctor.

World Vision, with support from Education Cannot Wait, in partnership with Fin Church Aid and Save the Children, supported Moses and 875 schoolchildren in Tonj East with school materials. It aimed to increase school enrollment and retention.


Tonj East is heavily impacted by the hunger crisis due to communal conflicts and floods and displacements. People send their children to cattle camps to work instead of school.

Head teacher John Aker says, "In 2019, we had 320 children who registered in the school but many dropped out for lack scholastics materials. In 2020, when World Vision distributed the materials, the enrolment increased to 400. As of March 2022, we have a considerable increase of 650 pupils. I am optimistic that more will come. This education initiative is truly a boost for children's education."



WHERE WE WORK

In 2022, the collective efforts of 1,134 staff, government employees, and volunteers helped oversee the implementation of World Vision's programs and projects in 9 out of 10 states. These programs and projects were managed through 4 zonal offices based in Kuajok, Malakal, Juba, and Yambio. Operations of these zonal offices were augmented by 21 satellite offices.



2022 FINANCIALS & LINKAGES

Through the support of World Vision's partners, we are able to continue serving the most vulnerable children and their communities in South Sudan.

In FY22, World Vision's 54 active projects were undertaken in partnership with 7 INGOs, and 24 national and local organizations, including 4 faith-based organizations.
