WHAT WE DO

World Vision is committed to implementing resilience and livelihood programmes and projects in 37 townships, including 31 Area Programmes. The goal is to provide sustainable livelihood solutions to the most vulnerable households to break free from poverty and improve the well-being of their children. We aim to achieve the following outcomes:

- Improved and sustained household food security and child nutrition
- Enhanced income adequacy, security, and resilience
- Enhanced household resilience to shocks and stress

HOW WE WORK

WVM focuses on increasing agricultural productivity, improving market access, and fostering the growth of agribusiness and off-farm enterprises in targeted rural areas.

Improved and sustained household food security and child nutrition

WVM offers vital food supplies, livestock, and home gardening assistance to the most vulnerable children and families in order to enhance their food security and nutrition. We raise awareness and provide technical training in areas such as semi-intensive livestock rearing, pasture improvement, forage production, animal feed preservation, animal disease prevention and vegetable production as well as cash and seed support, to enhance agricultural output for sustainable food security and nutrition, especially for the most vulnerable children.



Enhanced income adequacy, security, and resilience

WVM understands that ensuring adequate income is crucial for household stability and resilience. WVM implements key core project models such as Savings for Transformation (S4T), and Building Secure Livelihoods (BSL) that include local value chain development (LVCD), training and support for climate-smart agriculture (CSA), and natural resources management (NRM) and, inclusive market system development (iMSD) while collaborating with Vision Fund Myanmar for Micro-Finance (MF). These models facilitate economic empowerment and financial inclusion for households, ultimately benefiting child well-being. Furthermore, WVM provides technical vocational education and training (TVET) opportunities to enhance the skills and capacities of poor households as well as training and support for planning and implementation of small business development activities, with a particular emphasis on youth and women from vulnerable backgrounds.

Enhanced household resilience to shocks and stress

To build resilience, WVM supports the development of small-scale irrigation systems, encourages secondary and cash crop production, and promotes sustainable agriculture practices. We emphasize the implementation of natural resources management techniques such as Farmer Managed Natural Restoration (FMNR) and Sloping Agriculture Land Techniques (SALT), which contribute to long-term resilience and environmental sustainability.

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
