Dear Friends of the Children of Burundi,

One of the paradoxes in Burundi is that; it is a very verdant and well-watered country. However, malnutrition is leading by 55%¹ to stunted growth among children. One would think that with the water and the productivity of the land, food at home should not be a problem to children and their parents and clean water should be easily available.

But that is not the case. And that is why we in World Vision in partnership with the government, communities, donors, the UN and local and international NGO partners work towards eliminating this paradox and making the lives of Burundi children, and their parents easier and better.

We are making good progress and in 2022, we were able to provide food, water, health care, and education to 1,566,577 children through our 22 long term area programs and grant funded projects.

We focused our interventions in four areas- Food Security and Nutrition with the singular objective of ensuring that children 0-5 years are well-nourished. Health, Water, Sanitation and Hygiene with the objective of ensuring that children are protected from diseases and infections. Education with

We assure them that we do this on a daily basis and thank them for their faith and trust in us.



# **FOOD AND NUTRITION SECURITY**

Strategic Objective: Increase in number of children who are well nourished

The primary objective of food and nutrition interventions is to reduce malnutrition in children under the age of five. Our programmes are centered on enhancing household production of nutrientdense foods in order to increase access and utilization of variety of dietary food.

Since the beginning of the current strategy's implementation (FY21-FY25), food and nutrition security interventions have reached a total of 1,144,348 people, including 526,400 children,

### Food and Nutrition Security Success Story



Edouard, 15, a grade 7 school child, lives with his parents and 7 siblings in Gitaba community, Rutana commune. Edouard's home life has been tough since harvests were not enough as they could not get chemical fertilizers or organic manure for the farms.

His parents had to sell labour power for wages to supplement their harvests.

Last year, Edouard was lucky to be among the beneficiaries of Impact+ approach training that targets children that are in school and those out of school where he was trained on farming and breeding techniques. The training reached 210 children grouped in 7 Impact+ clubs in Edouard's community.

"In my Impact+ school club, we were trained on farming and breeding techniques. After the training, I received some money from my parents and started farm and off-farm activities", says Edouard. "I started the breeding of guinea pigs, goats, grew onions and embarked on beekeeping.", Edouard adds.

Edouard is now able to pay his school fees, buys his clothes and helps his younger sister with some school expenses. Organic manure from pigs and goats is helping to increase harvests which have enabled the family to have adequate food.

"I can now easily support my education, buy my clothes and help my young sister pay school fees as well thanks to improved harvests", a cheerful Edouard concluded.

#### TWITEZIMBERE RWARUKA Youth Club:

The club is composed of 26 members ( 9 male and 17 female) and aims at promoting the development of their community through a change of mindset. They currently grow eggplants, maize, soya beans, beans, onions and peppers for sale. They also belong to a savings group, which enables them to save and obtain loans for capital.

The club currently has 15 goats, 9 of which have been given to the members so that each member can benefit; they have 200,000 BIF (approx. 100\$) in their account. They have also given loans of 250,000 BIF to the members. They have in-



vestments in agriculture of about 750,000 BIF and have bought land of about 1,500,000 Bf. Each of the members has their own activities that generate income for them.

After learning from the TWITEZIMBERE RWARU-KA Youth Club, six more clubs with 245 members (177 female and 60 male) were started. The clubs have their own vegetable plots, savings and credit schemes. Their impact in the community is significant; 30 families have learnt from them and started growing vegetables. Youth from the locality have replicated the same and this has reduced idleness and youth crime.

# HEALTH, WATER SANITATION AND HYGIENE

#### Strategic Objective: Increase in children protected from diseases and infections

Integrated health and WASH interventions contribute to the reduction of preventable childhood diseases such as malaria, pneumonia, diarrhoea and other communicable diseases.

Health projects in FY22 focused on strengthening the capacity of Community Health

Volunteers (CHVs) to increase knowledge and awareness, leading to behaviour change at individual and household levels in maternal and child health practices. Through the integration of WASH interventions, the focus was on enabling communities to access safe water sources, improved sanitation services and improved hygiene practices.



### **Impact story**

Rebecca, 10 years old, is a registered child from Mishiha community. She is studying in grade 2 of basic school and living with her both parents. They depend on farming to earn their living.

She enjoys clean water near her home; however, in the past life was tough.

"I used to walk a very long distance to fetch water that was not even clean. As a consequence, most of the time, I was late at school, recurrently suffered diarrhea and my school performance was not good", Rebecca recounts.

Now the situation has changed for good. World Vision constructed water points in Rebecca's community and trained community members on how to protect them.

"I can wash my hands with soap, especially after using the latrine, and I am doing well in my class. I am thankful to World Vision for all they did for my community, especially for having brought us clean water", Rebecca says.



### **EDUCATION**

Strategic Objective: Increase in Primary School Children Who Can Read

Education projects focused on basic education specifically in primary schools. Key problems affecting primary education in Burundi include; poor quality of teaching and learning in schools, which results in high school dropouts and low literacy levels. World Vision International Burundi contributed to improve the quality of teaching and learning environment and 161,300 children have been reached in 275 schools.

### **Impact Story**

# Good learning environment brings good performance

Nishimwe, 9, a registered child who lives with his parents and two siblings, no longer sits on the floor to study. That changed after World Vision provided desks for his school in the Vumbi Area Programme in Northern Burundi.

"At school, me and my classmates had a big problem following our teachers because we were sitting on the floor or on stones. We had no desks in our classroom of 73 pupils," said Nishimwe.

Vumbi World Vision's Area programme helped Nishimwe's school with 80 desks to improve the learning environment. This was done in collaboration with the local administration and education authorities.

"Now I can sit comfortably and follow the lessons well; my back no longer hurts and my school performance has improved," says Nishimwe. The Vumbi programme supported one school with 80 desks for 2 classrooms of young children from first to second grade. This enabled other pupils in the same situation as Nishimwe to be reached. The two classrooms benefit 320 pupils, 149 boys and 171 girls.



# CHILD WELLBEING MONITORING, COMMUNITY **ENGAGEMENT AND ADVOCACY**

Strategic Objective: Increase in children who have positive and peaceful relations in their families and communities

The integration of community engagement, child well-being monitoring and advocacy addresses the negative worldviews of people that lead to child rights violations. Specifically, projects promote the adoption of attitudes, social norms and practices that are sensitive to and supportive of children's rights and care. This is done by equipping parents, caregivers, local and faith leaders with the capacity to address norms, practices and attitudes that are harmful to children. Systems and structures are also strengthened and policies enforced. Attitudes

are changed through the empowerment of parents and communities at large. Another intervention is to empower the most vulnerable youth to be social innovators with the skills and competencies to identify problems and challenges in their communities and implement solutions to these problems. Our projects also provide opportunities for boys and girls to participate and engage meaningfully in decision-making processes at all levels.

#### **Impact story**

Sylvestre, 12, is a registered child from Gikwiye community of Gasorwe commune. He lives with his parents and 3 siblings.

His father spent the little money he gained from selling labour on alcoholism and could not provide to his family. He always guarreled with Sylvestre's mother.

After participating in a training on celebrating family approach, which focuses on the empowerment of couples affected by broken relationships, his father changed his old habits and reconciled with his spouse.

"My father would come back home late and drunk and quarreled with my mother almost every night. I didn't understand why he was often beating my mother. My siblings, my mother and I were unhappy. He could not provide school materials and this made me drop out of school. I am happy that currently my father and mom reconciled and I have resumed school", says Sylvestre.



# **HUMANITARIAN EMERGENCY AFFAIRS**

During this financial year, World Vision International Burundi focused its interventions on environmental disasters and infectious diseases, particularly in responding to the wounds pandemic in Muramvya and the Rift valley fever outbreak. For the wound pandemic, World Vision International Burundi supported 3,881 children with wound treatment with a budget of 67,000 USD.

The WFP-funded Home Grown School Feeding project provided school meals in 145 schools in Muyinga Province. The project reached 124,788 pupils, 63,376 boys and 61,412 girls from nursery and primary schools. The returnee project has reached 5936 HHs with a total of 18153 people. A school feeding programme is being implemented by WVIB in 145 schools in Muyinga Province.

The project aims to reduce school dropout, a recurring problem in Burundi, and to improve student performance and retention. Blaise Pascal Misago, the Provincial Director of educationsays that the programme is very commendable as a strategy not only to respond to the educational and nutritional needs of the children in the targeted schools, but also because the programmes help parents to go about their errands knowing that their children will have food for the day.



#### **Impact story**

Emelyne, a young girl from Cagizo School, (the school has 1.500 school children) testifies that the school programme has been very helpful to her and her family. Before the programme, she was thinking of dropping out of school because of hunger; coming home from school and not having anything to eat was a big challenge. Her parents are poor and unable to provide the necessary meals for her and her siblings during the day.

The school feeding programme has come as a solution to the many problems caused by the lack of sufficient food for students in schools. She is now proud of her performance in class and excited to come to school every morning.


In addition to improving hygiene



Word Vision supported in strengthening the water system with solar pumps increasing the quantity of water per refugee from 10l to 20l. The time that mothers and children used to collect water in the host community is reserved for other activities. Furthermore, the sensitizations and trainings organized by WVIB equipped them with skills and knowledge to start and grow their tailoring and provided with start up materials. The trainings were inclusive and people with disabilities were trained in multiple livelihoods activities.

"On my side, my heart is filled with gratitude towards WVIB for coming to intervene in our camp." In his experience in camps, this being his second camp, he had never seen a project that involves people with disabilities.
