

COUNTRY CONTEXT

World Vision International Democratic Republic of Congo

Despite being blessed with bountiful natural resources, the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC) is one of the most fragile countries in the world. Poor health, education, severe food insecurity and normalization of violence undermine the well-being and God-given potential of most Congolese children. In 2020, the country ranked 175th on the Human Development Index1.

At the roots of the situation are decades of exploitation and poor governance which led to high levels of poverty. These

are being aggravated by recurring and protracted crises and violent conflicts over political power and natural resources. Religious institutions play an important role in providing essential social services and in supporting the spiritual and behavioural changes needed for peaceful development.

Key trends that concern us:

Health & Nutrition

Children's survival and health in the DRC remain at risk due to precarious health, nutrition, water and sanitation conditions. Stunting rates have not improved in years and access to sanitation is worsening. Recurrent pandemics exacerbate the situation.

Education


Despite significant efforts made, children's development remains substantially impacted by low education outcomes and transition rates, particularly for girls. Violent conflict and attacks on schools affect children's access to education and educational experiences.

Protection

Violence is normalized and most children experience multiple forms of violence in their homes and communities, harming children's psychological and physical well-being. In conflict areas, between 60 and 70 % of combatants are under 18.6

Humanitarian Situation7

2.8 million people are internally displaced, due to conflict and



disaster, and 20 million people need humanitarian assistance.

Our History

Since 1984, World Vision has contributed to improving the well-being of the most vulnerable children and families throughout the DRC.

Today, we work, in partnership with local organisations, in 12 provinces. We aim to expand our programme in this coming strategy cycle into four more (Ituri, Kwilu, Haut Lomami, and Kasai).

Grounded firmly in our Christian faith, we tackle the spiritual roots of vulnerability and empower children, families, and communities through integrated and transformational development practices and life-saving emergency responses.

Our core competencies

Health and nutrition: We successfully support mothers and caregivers to adopt healthy feeding and nutrition practices and identify and refer children to therapeutic feeding. We prevent infectious diseases (malaria and HIV) and promote birth spacing and antenatal care.

Water, sanitation, and hygiene (WASH): We effectively promote safe hygiene practices, access to water and sanitation, school WASH and menstrual hygiene.

Education: We promote children's school enrolment and help children improve their reading outcomes. We also strengthen children's and young people's socio-emotional learning outcomes, enabling them to live and work positively and peacefully with each other.

Food Security and livelihoods: Our savings, loans, and agricultural training and support activities make demonstratable improvements in household economic levels, food security and children's dietary diversity and food frequency. We are a recognised partner for food distribution and school feeding in emergencies.

Child Protection: working with faith leaders and effective community approaches, we foster social cohesion and positive family relationships; advocating and improving community mechanisms, we strengthen national child protection systems

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OUR APPROACH

World Vision International Democratic Republic of Congo

We will mainstream the use of our fragile context programme approach to allow an agile shift from meeting intermediate humanitarian needs to addressing root causes and supporting transformative shifts – even in the context of continued fragility.

This approach will be key for our ability to work along the humanitarian-development-peace nexus.

We strategically commit to:

- Strengthen our engagement in humanitarian clusters
- Build partnerships with specialist organisations
- Ensure the use of a no-harm-approach in all our work



Our goal is to reach 130,000 people with WASH services using an integrated WASH approach. This means that we will, wherever possible, integrate WASH into our health, nutrition, food security, livelihoods, and education programs and projects.

Our approach focuses on the whole water and sanitation chain, promotes intersectoral partnerships, and sustainable financing mechanisms to ensure steady financial flows into and between local and national levels. We will also contribute to national, regional, and global learning in multi-sector interventions


Using our community scorecard methodology, "citizen voice and action" and child protection advocacy, we will promote improvements in the quality and availability of health, education, and protection services. Both models will be primary drivers for our advocacy as they generate bottom-up pressure for change.

At the same time, our long-term development Programmes processes will build on and strengthen existing government efforts and influence the improvement of decentralised governance and the use of resources. At the national level, we will continue to nurture productive relationships with line ministries and public service leadership to influence change.

We are dedicated to reaching the most vulnerable children in the DRC. This means we must apply an intersectional approach to assess social factors that lead to exclusion of groups of children – such as age, gender, disability, and ethnicity.

We commit to assessing these factors systematically at the project level and to using effective methods to address harmful social norms at the roots of different discrimination., wherever possible together with faith leaders and children and youth themselves.
