OUR VULNERABILITY

85% rural areas do not have access to improved toilets (Vanuatu National Statistics Office, 2020)

Comprising of an archipelago of 83 islands, Vanuatu is rated as the most vulnerable country out of 181 countries across the world, to be impacted by the rapidly increasing effects of climate change.

Rising sea levels and increased frequency and intensity extreme weather events, such as cyclones, of earthquakes and tsunamis bring heavy rainfall, intense winds, storm surges and frequent flooding to the many small, remote and often low-lying islands.

Coastal erosion poses a significant challenge, with increasing saltwater intrusion reducing the availability of fresh, safe drinking water and unmanaged sanitation and wastewater compromising the health and well-being for many.

The presence of six active volcanos across the country exposes inhabitants to frequent risk of volcanic ashfall, destroying crops and contaminating water sources, impacting water security for the population of more than 300 000 people and exacerbating access to basic needs for the most vulnerable people.

People with disability are 2.45 times more likely as those without, to be affected by natural disasters in Vanuatu

WHO WE ARE

World Vision has been partnering with communities in Vanuatu for over 40 years and currently has 93 employees (88 are Vanuatu citizens) who have experience responding to humanitarian disasters, reducing gender-based violence; enabling resilient livelihoods; and ensuring inclusive access to water, sanitation and hygiene through programs across four of Vanuatu's six provinces.
