HUMANITARIAN SITUATION IN THE COUNTRY

The Diffa region, located in the Lake Chad basin, is facing a serious humanitarian crisis due to ongoing conflict and attacks by armed groups.

This situation has caused significant population displacements and a deterioration of living conditions. Internal Displaced Persons, refugees and host communities face major challenges, including



food,



healthcare



and education.

In 2024, floods in Niger devastated the lives and livelihoods of many populations. As of October 14, the damage identified affected eight regions of the country, affecting more than

households.



These floods have caused considerable losses, jeopardizing the safety and wellbeing of affected families, and requiring urgent intervention to meet their basic needs and support their recovery.

spread across nine communes.

In total, \$ **125,218** were distributed in the form of unconditional cash to improve the food security of affected families.

• A30 m³ reservoir was built on the market garden site, accompanied by a fountain, to store abundant water when solar radiation is insufficient. This infrastructure will increase the productivity of the site and ensure rational use of water and will benefit to 203 households (1,421 persons), thus improving their living conditions and food security.

 A supply of tools and work materials including 15 telephones, 15 power banks, 15 bicycles, 75 mats and 15 sets of envelopes was given to the 15 Community Early Warning and Emergency Response System (SCAP-RU) agent in Ouallam. This allocation will make it possible to improve the functioning of the **15** SCAPRU agents in the transmission of data, thus benefiting **20,573** people (**4,065** women, **3,753** men, **6,633** girls and **6,122** boys), by strengthening their capacity to collect and share crucial information for the community.

- On-site technical training was carried out on 3 market gardening sites located in the communes of Guidan Roumdji and Guidan Sori. These training courses benefited 157 farmers, including 103 men, reaching a total of 1,099 beneficiaries. This initiative helped improve the technical skills of farmers, thus strengthening their capacity to optimize vegetable production and improve their livelihoods.
- Women's group of the village of Kouroungoussaou, in the commune of Chadakori, received peanut oil extraction kits. This group, made up of **31** women, benefits from this initiative aimed at improving their financial empowerment and boosting the processing of local products. Thanks to this equipment, women will be able to increase their production of peanut oil, generate additional income and strengthen their economic independence.

HEALTH & NUTRITION

2000 cooking demonstration sessions were organized in the villages of the FARN site. Through these demonstrations, local communities were able to adopt healthier eating practices, helping to improve their overall health and well-being.

These sessions not only make it possible to measure the performance of the program, but also to decide on the referral of children to health centers for adequate care.

Through this initiative, communities have been able to adopt healthier eating practices, helping to improve the overall health and well-being of families.

PROTECTION

- Organization of a social cohesion activities that brought together men, women and children from the town of Ouallam, the refugee camp, the site of internally displaced persons and the village of Samtigué. This event demonstrated the importance of peaceful coexistence for this population. The competition attracted a significant number of spectators, with 243 men and 426 women, for a total of 669 people.
- An awareness campaigns were carried out via community radios (Baarou and Yillwa) in Ouallam and Simiri. 30 messages were broadcast on the themes of inter-ethnic marriage (in Ouallam) and respect for parents.
- Community activities on children's education took place in the villages of Kokobera, Banne Béri, Ouallam and Dabré, reaching 369 people (including 192 women). The objective of these actions is to raise awareness among populations of mutual understanding and tolerance for peaceful coexistence.
- Community awareness raising was also

carried out by the peace committees of the villages of Samari, Tongome and Talkadabey on conflict prevention and management, reaching 2,295 people (including 1,224 women). In addition, awareness campaigns on nature preservation and natural resource management were conducted by the management committees of the restored sites in the villages of Samari and Talkadabey, reaching 5,110 people (including 2,845 women and 118 people disabled). These initiatives aim to promote peace, tolerance and sustainable management of natural resources within communities.

- A football match was organized at the displaced people's site, where six teams (boys and girls) competed against each other. The winning teams (boys and girls) were rewarded with gifts, reaching approximately 203 girls and 191 boys.
- The recreational activities took place on November 30, 2024, with various games allowing children to have fun and share highlights of entertainment. These activities reached 225 girls and 201 boys, providing a space of relaxation and conviviality for displaced young people.
