



The statement emphasized the alignment of the **ENOUGH** Campaign with Sustainable Development Goal 2 on zero hunger, underscoring our vision for a world where every child is nourished and empowered to grow and develop to their full potential. WORLD VISION LESOTHO PARTNERS WITH THE GOVERNMENT TO COMBAT CHILD HUNGER AND MALNUTRITION



At World Vision Lesotho, we understand that partnerships with key stakeholders, including the government, are essential to addressing critical issues like child hunger and malnutrition. We believe that collaboration is key to achieving lasting change, and this is why we are consistently aligned with the Government of Lesotho's efforts to tackle food insecurity. On November 2024, we had the privilege of meeting with the Minister of Agriculture, Food Security, and Nutrition, Hon. Thabo Mofosi where we officially introduced the #ENOUGH Campaign—a bold initiative aimed at eradicating child hunger and improving food security for vulnerable communities across the country.



During our meeting, we shared the vision behind the #ENOUGH Campaign, which seeks to raise awareness about the urgency of addressing hunger and malnutrition in Lesotho, particularly for children who are most at risk. We emphasized the need for a unified approach that includes both government action and community-based solutions to ensure sustainable food security. In this context, we discussed practical strategies that can be implemented to increase access to nutritious food, improve agricultural practices, and create resilient systems to support communities in the face of ongoing challenges like droughts



and climate change.

Meeting with the Minister of Agriculture, Food Security and Nutrition

The meeting culminated in an invitation extended to the Minister for the official launch of the #ENOUGH Campaign on 5th December 2024, marking an important milestone in our ongoing commitment to combating food insecurity in Lesotho. Together with the Government of Lesotho, we aim to ensure that every child has enough food to grow, learn, and thrive. By working together, we believe we can create a future where no child goes to bed hungry, and where food security is not a privilege, but a basic human right for every child in Lesotho.




WORLD VISION AND WFP ADVOCATE FOR THE RIGHT TO FOOD ON WORLD FOOD DAY 2024

This year's World Toilet Day celebration was a reminder that everyone, regardless of gender, deserves access to sanitation that ensures privacy and safety. Leche, a 15-year-old student, shared his powerful perspective on the importance of toilets, emphasizing that they provide much-needed privacy and security for all children, both girls and boys. His words reflect the collective need for more efforts toward ensuring access to proper sanitation in every community.

World Vision Lesotho, in collaboration with our partners, joined the vibrant community of Ha Mohlakoana at Bolula Primary School in Quthing district to stand united against abuse unter the theme: Unite to end violence against women and children.

From November 25 to December 10, 2024, World Vision Lesotho, in partnership with the European Union in Lesotho and other partners, joined the #16DaysOfActivism campaign to raise awareness and advocate for the elimination of gender-based violence (GBV). This global campaign highlights the urgent need to address the violence and abuse that disproportionately affects women and children. Gender-based violence is not just a violation of human rights—it is a significant barrier to achieving gender equality and building a just, sustainable society. Empowering women and girls is critical for creating a future where everyone can live free from fear, violence, and discrimination.

collaborated with the community Mohlakoana in Quthing district, holding a vibrant and informative event at Bolula Primary School. The community united under the theme "Unite to End Violence Against Women and Children" to discuss and raise awareness about critical issues affecting women and children in the area. In response to the alarming food insecurity crisis in Lesotho, World Vision Lesotho, through the EU Civil Protection and Humanitarian Aid-funded project 'Consolidating and Strengthening Disaster Risk Reduction Capacities in Lesotho,' launched a food distribution initiative in Mohale. This effort is part of the broader El Niño response aimed at alleviating the devastating impacts of prolonged drought and food shortages on the most vulnerable populations. Lifesaving food packages were distributed to 45 households, offering muchneeded relief to families struggling to cope with the ongoing crisis.

Lesotho faces one of its most severe food crises, with over 403,000 people—27% of the population—at risk of acute food insecurity in the coming months. The situation, exacerbated by the El Niño phenomenon, has left many families without access to basic necessities, threatening the health and well-being of children and their communities. Through this project, we are not only addressing immediate food needs but also strengthening disaster risk reduction capacities to enhance resilience and preparedness for future crises.

WORLD VISION LESOTHO RESPONDS TO EL NIÑO DROUGHT WITH EMERGENCY FOOD ASSISTANCE PROJECT



he devastating El Niño drought has left 700,000 Basotho facing severe food insecurity, threatening their livelihoods and well-being. In response to this crisis, World Vision Lesotho, in partnership with USAID's Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance, launched the Emergency Food Assistance Project – Lesotho (EFAP-L). This vital initiative aims to provide immediate relief to those most affected by the drought, helping families survive and rebuild in the face of a humanitarian emergency. The project focuses on delivering essential aid to food-insecure communities across Lesotho, with a special emphasis on restoring hope, dignity, and resilience to vulnerable households.



The first distribution took place in Matelile, where 343 food-insecure households received cash assistance to help them meet their urgent food needs. This support is helping families access nutritious meals, ensuring that children, the elderly, and other vulnerable groups are protected from the worst impacts of hunger. With a total of 2,595 households across three districts set to benefit from this initiative. EFAP-L is making a significant difference in the lives of many who are struggling to cope with the ongoing crisis. By providing cash assistance, the project enables households to purchase food based on their individual needs, about their own survival and recovery, his humanitarian response is not just about providing short-term relief, but also about building long-term resilience in affected

Through our EU-funded projects. Accelerating Action for Eliminating Child Labour and Forced Labour (AECFL) and the Promotion and Protection of Human Rights Project, we conducted a comprehensive Media Engagement and Training Workshop aimed at equipping local media professionals with the tools and knowledge to drive transformative change. This initiative underscored the crucial role of the media in advocating for human rights, amplifying marginalized voices, and shaping public perceptions on pressing issues affecting vulnerable populations in Lesotho.



The workshop brought together 12 editors from prominent media houses, engaging them on their pivotal role in influencing public discourse and policy advocacy. Discussions focused on the media's power to elevate issues such as child trafficking, trafficking in persons, and the rights of people with disabilities. Bv fostering deeper understanding of these issues, the workshop aimed to inspire editors to prioritize human rights stories in their reporting, ensuring these critical topics receive the attention they deserve.



Additionally, 43 journalists received specialized training on ethical reporting practices, emphasizing their responsibility as advocates for change. Topics included accurate reporting on human trafficking, child labor, and disability rights, as well as the importance of portraying survivors with dignity and respect. Participants explored practical strategies for investigative journalism, building narratives that educate the public and hold duty bearers accountable. This training reaffirmed our commitment to partnering with the media as catalysts for awareness, advocacy, and action, ensuring a more just and equitable society for all.

The event brought together stakeholders who discussed the critical barriers children face in accessing education due to natural disasters, including flooding, drought, and severe infrastructure and learning. The children present at the event highlighted that their right to a safe, uninterrupted education should never be compromised, even when disasters strike.



The campaign focused on collaborative efforts with the Ministry of Education & Training, the Disaster Management Authority, and other partners to improve the physical infrastructure of schools in vulnerable areas. As these areas are often hit by disasters such as flash floods and landslides, many schools have poor infrastructure, making it difficult extreme weather hits. Thanks to the support of the stakeholders, crucial resources were mobilized, including building blocks, cement, and window frames, to repair and improve school facilities, ensuring they can withstand future natural disasters and continue to provide safe spaces for children to learn.



The event underscored the urgent need for disasterresilient education systems and demonstrated that by working together, communities can overcome the challenges posed by disasters.
