Brief Overview

Angola, a country with a population of over 30 million people, faces significant socio-economic and environmental challenges, particularly in the southern regions where severe drought has heavily impacted communities. The lack of rainfall and the scarcity of resources have worsened food insecurity, making the situation even more critical for thousands of families, especially in rural and hard-to-reach areas.

Moreover, the fragility of health systems, particularly in rural areas, and the high maternal and child mortality rates have hindered access to essential care for the most vulnerable populations. These combined factors have increased inequalities and poverty, affecting the well-being of many children and families.

This report aims to highlight three crucial initiatives by World Vision Angola to contribute to addressing these food and health emergencies in the country. The actions focus especially on mitigating the impacts of drought and improving maternal and child health, aiming to alleviate food insecurity, combat malnutrition, and reduce maternal and child mortality in these highly affected communities, which have been prioritized for the implementation of these interventions.

As a child-focused organization dedicated to improving the well-being of the most vulnerable children, World Vision has been working in Angola since 1989. Our development programs are focused on:

- Improving the health and nutrition of children and their families
- Improving access to water and sanitation facilities
- Strengthening civil society, child protection, and social protection systems
- Improving educational opportunities
- Increasing family resilience, focusing on economic development and land ownership

Our programs benefit approximately **1 million people annually**, and for this strategic implementation cycle, we aim to reach about **2.5 million** children in the country.

Food Security and Resilience; Angoalissar Food Distribution

GIK Beneficiaries: 120 vulnerable families in the Rio Nene community Impact: Strengthened food security for 120 families during the dry period.

Main Focus Areas: Strengthening food and nutrition security for families affected by the drought emergency in Southern Angola.

- Received shipments: 5 tons of food items in the Huíla province.
- •10 kg of yellow maize flour.
- 10 kg of pinto beans.
- ullet 10 kg of iodized fine salt.
- •20 packs of 400g of food paste.
- •50 packs of powdered milk (1 kg each).

Food Security and Resilience; KOIKA Food Distribution

GIK Beneficiaries: 1,600 families

Impact: Contributing to reducing food insecurity and combating severe child malnutrition.

Main Focus Areas: Strengthening food and nutrition security for families affected by the drought emergency in Southern Angola.

As part of the Southern Angola Drought Emergency Response initiative, over 4 tons of food were distributed in Huíla province between October 23rd and 25th. Funded by the Korea International Cooperation Agency (KOICA), this project benefited approximately 1,600 families in the municipalities of Chibia and Humpata, especially those with children suffering from severe malnutrition, who were identified and monitored by Community Health Development Agents.

- Received shipments: 4 tons of food items.
- 100 kg of yellow maize flour.
- •13.5 kg of beans.
- •5.125 kg of vegetable oil.







Maternal and Child Health More and Better Health Medicine Distribution

GIK Beneficiaries: 100,000 pregnant women

Impact: Ensuring that more women and children, regardless of where they live, have access to essential healthcare and a prosperous future.


Main Focus Areas: The "Maternal and Child Health More and Better Health Project" aims to reduce maternal and child mortality rates, with special attention to pregnant women.

The "More and Better Health" project, funded by Azule Energy and implemented by World Vision Angola in Luanda, has significantly contributed to improving the health of over 100,000 pregnant and postpartum women, as well as benefiting vulnerable children in the province.

- Received shipments: 79,980 bottles of multivitamins.
- •900,000 Albendazole tablets for health units in targeted municipalities.







The actions implemented by World Vision, with the support of partners such as KOIKA, AngoAlissar, and Azule Energy, had a significant impact on the food and nutritional security of families affected by the drought, as well as on improving the health conditions of pregnant women and children.
