

WE INSPIRE LEARNING, **ACTION AND PRAYER**

Standing with the world's most vulnerable children means taking action that can transform their lives - and inspiring others to do the same, through prayer and advocacy to change the hearts and minds of people in power.

Inspired by Ephesians 4:1-15 and Matthew 5:14-16, we are called to speak the truth in love and break the silence. World Vision joined the global movement, marching alongside our partners through Port Vila during the '16 Days of Activism Against Gender-Based Violence.' Throughout the month, our team passionately advocated, engaging with the community through radio and social media to inspire a vision of a future free from violence. We also took time to reflect on our own beliefs and actions, striving to heal past wounds and create a better future for every child.

Across 2023 and 2024, World Vision Vanuatu engaged the community through radio, public forum discussions and social media, sharing our knowledge and experience in supporting healing and restoration within families.

HOLDING SPACE **FOR HEALING**

In 2024, World Vision's WOVEN project, supported by the New Zealand Government's Negotiated Partnerships and World Vision New Zealand, facilitated four Restorative Justice (RJ) conferences in Vanuatu. More than 60 participants-including men who have used violence, victims, family members, and community leaders-engaged in these sessions, which provided a safe space to openly share the impact of violence on their lives. RJ ensures all voices are heard, with equal opportunities for participation, including children and youth if they choose.

Since its 2023 pilot, World Vision's REACH Family Centre has refined this approach with guidance from RJ specialist John McDonald. REACH Family Centre Programming Director Shanna Ligo emphasises that RJ must remain victim-centred, particularly in cases of gender-based violence (GBV):

"Healing and restoration look different for everyone impacted by harm. Respecting each person's journey is essential for both the person who used violence and the community. The needs and perspectives of victims must guide every stage of the RJ process in GBV cases."

A REACH staff member highlighted how RJ complements traditional reconciliation practices in Vanuatu, which often involve family and local leaders in mediating disputes:

"Traditional reconciliation sometimes lacks the structure to fully address victims' emotional needs. RJ fills this gap with a trauma-informed framework that minimises the risk of re-traumatisation and unresolved tensions."

The mother of a deceased woman shared how transformative the experience was for her:

"It was an opportunity for me to express my feelings. It allows the perpetrator to see that what he has done has affected the whole family. I went through the meeting and I could release something that was inside me. I knew it was something I held inside me and it wasn't good for me. I was able to release it and feel glad and free."

INCLUSIVE WATER, SANITATION & HYGEINE

11,215+ families reached by our Inclusive WASH & WASH Emergency Response work across 38 communities

Access to water has emerged as the greatest need in Vanuatu with estimates indicating that around 60% of people in Shefa and Tafea provinces have no access to clean drinking water. In addition to this, working water systems are threatened by the fragility of freshwater sources and infrastructure, particularly in a disaster prone country. World Vision Vanuatu works with and through our partners to deliver water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) systems and behaviour change solutions as a vehicle to improve the health and well-being of people, including those most vulnerable or marginalised, across 4 projects.

Drinking Water Safety & Security Planning (DWSSP)

The Government of Vanuatu's preferred methodology for increasing community water and sanitation access, developed through a collaborative process with communities.





CLIMATE RESILIENT LIVELIHOODS

6908+ families reached by our CRL work across 34 communities

Vanuatu has the highest probability among all Pacific countries of being hit by a severe natural disaster (29.4%). There are limited social safety systems that can provide financial support when households are impacted by climate change. Agriculture, forestry and fishery is the largest single employment sector, closely followed by tourism. World Vision Vanuatu's Climate Resilient Livelihoods portfolio works across 6 different projects to create strong foundations which community members can use to build sustainable households by increasing job readiness, available household savings and agricultural innovations. Programs focus on small business education, financial management through savings for transformation, agricultural and nature-based solutions. Methods focus on creating resilient and inclusive social enterprises, equipping farmers with the tools they need to grow their supply, engaging and empowering young people and women in resilience building, and developing community adaptation & coping strateties.

OUR APPROACHES

Nakamal Blong Yut/IMPACT+

Youth clubs provide opportunities for youth to increase their confidence and demonstrate leadership.

Resilient and Inclusive Social Enterprises,

also known as RISE, is a business training curriculum, targeting potential entrepreneurs, small businesses, and larger businesses. It is uniquely designed for a Melanesian context and provides trainees with the skills needed to profitably manage a business, while also balancing the family and social obligations that form an important part of the fabric of Melanesian life.

Training and support focused on building balanced and nutritious diets, using creative visuals for facilitated learning and further supported by cooking demonstrations.

Mama Namba


Focused on numeracy, Mama Nama trains women on basic numeracy skills that support increased economic participation in the productive sector and household budgeting.

In partnership with IOM, World Vision Vanuatu supports the Vanuatu Department of Labour in delivering a pre-departure training for seasonal workers and their families to encourage financial goal setting and providing strategies for sustaining family connection.

Inclusive Savings 4 Transformation

iS4T groups are community-led savings and loan groups, offering members the opportunity to improve the small loans, and pool their resources to contribute to community needs. Savings are shared out to members at the end of each 1-year cycle.

DISASTER PREPAREDNESS

466 families reached by our Disaster Preparedness and Response work across 39 communities

Vanuatu is considered the most vulnerable country to natural disaster in the world. This is due to both the regular occurrence of natural hazards, including cyclones, earthquakes, tsunamis and volcanoes, exacerbated by the geographic isolation of communities. World Vision supports communities to prepare and respond to disasters by leveraging our comprehensive suite of tools and approaches and our extensive experience to ensure that the needs of the most vulnerable people are met. After the immediate response, our recovery interventions are integrated into our ongoing development programming to strengthen long-term resilience and promote sustainability. World Vision is heavily invested in coordinating with, and being accountable to, the Vanuatu Government, humanitarian and donor partners, and the communities we serve.

OUR APPROACHES

CDCCC Support

Community Disaster & Climate Change Committees are the core government mechanism to encourage resilience to disasters at the community level. World Vision Vanuatu supports communities with training and registration with the Government of Vanuatu.

Haos Blong Yumi

Strengthening household resilience through training on cyclone safe building techniques, disaster risk reduction considerations, budgeting and project management of home building projects so that families utilise their resources in climate smart ways.

Are You Disaster Ready?

It's important every family has their own disaster preparedness plan, and it's crucial for people with disabilities and their family members to have a tailored plan that ensures all needs are incorporated into a family preparedness plan. This training supports people with disabilities and their family members and caregivers to understand early warning systems, plan ahead and ensure essentials are packed in emergency kits.

ENDING VIOLENCE

1,169 families reached by our ending violence work across 20 communities

Vanuatu has some of the highest rates of violence against women and children in the world. Consistent exposure to violence in the home has severe impacts on the longterm well-being and vulnerability of children, increasing the likelihood that the children will use violence or experience violence in the future - perpetuating an intergenerational cycle of violence.

The REACH Family Centre, established by World Vision Vanuatu in 2021, provides a safe space for individuals and families to heal from violence and access Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS). The centre builds upon World Vision's extensive experience delivering evidence-based, community-centred gender and protection programming aimed at ending violence against women and girls.

Through faith, culture, and evidencebased programs, we empower men, women, and children to build healthier relationships, develop resilience, and break cycles of harm.

OUR APPROACHES

Men Be the Change (MBC)

Developed in Vanuatu, MBC is a 12-week behaviour change program, including retreats, that help men who use violence take responsibility for their actions, develop healthier coping strategies, and build respectful relationships. Evaluations have found the approach is effective in reducing the severity of the use of violence and transforming the harmful attitudes of participants.

Strong Famili

A six-week parenting and family resilience program that equips caregivers with positive parenting techniques. The direct work with children aims to provide a safe space for healing and restoration for children who have been exposed to violence through play, art, and mindfulness approaches.

Support Groups

Facilitated group sessions where individuals who have participated in REACH Centre programming can share experiences, receive ongoing guidance and connect with peers in a safe and supportive environment.

Leftemap Mama


An integrated, highly responsive support and education program with a primary focus on safeguarding and supporting women whose male partners are participating in Men Be the Change. This five-session program provides safety monitoring, emotional support, and resources to strengthen women's well being. The program also strengthens referral pathways to women's crisis and counselling services.

Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS)

We provide MHPSS to children, youth, and adults in the following way:

Children and youth: Play-based, trauma-informed support using art, storytelling, and mindfulness to help them heal and build resilience.

Adults: Trauma-informed support that helps individuals understand their emotions and triggers, develop coping strategies, build connections, and deepen their understanding of how to support children through trauma and when to seek assistance.

World Vision supports the V-Lab's incubation model, which mentored over 46 business with small seed funding & coaching. An additional 7 civil society organisations received further business grants.


WE ARE STEWARDS

As we reflect on Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24), it is evident that this year marks a significant milestone, representing the highest project expenditure levels in a decade. Since reaching its lowest spending threshold in Fiscal Year 2020, our program has seen a remarkable resurgence, with an impressive 104% increase in project expenditure over this period.

In FY24, Vanuatu has strategically prioritized six focus sectors, with economic development and livelihood development emerging as the sectors attracting the most substantial investment. This targeted approach underscores our commitment to enhancing the well-being and economic resilience of communities.

Additionally, our commitment to transparency and accountability has been reinforced through a series of comprehensive audits-both internal and external-as well as donor-led spot checks. We are pleased to report that these assessments yielded no significant adverse findings. The internal audit received a Green rating, indicating an acceptable level of compliance, while the external audit report affirming the integrity of our financial practices.

These achievements not only highlight our dedication to prudent financial management but also showcase our unwavering focus on delivering impactful outcomes for the communities we serve.
