

Ukraine Crisis Response | July 2025 Fact Sheet

World Vision Presence

In Ukraine, an 11-year conflict that started in the east of the country in 2014 reached to dramatic escalation of the war since the Russian Federation's 24 February 2022 invasion. It has caused the world's fastest growing displacement crisis since World War II, leaving at least:

- 35.8 million Population living in Ukraine 82% of total Ukrainian population before the conflict (43.5 million).
- 12.7 million People in need of humanitarian assistance in Ukraine - 35.7% of Population living in Ukraine.
- 5.7 million Refugees from Ukraine recorded across globally -13% of total Ukrainian population before the conflict (43.5 million).
- 3.3 million Internally displaced people 9% of Population living in Ukraine.

World Vision started working in Ukraine in March 2022 through 6 and now 3 active offices in Chernivtsi, Kyiv, Dnipro, which currently support aid efforts reaching conflict-affected people in 20 oblasts across Ukraine. WV UCR in Moldova concluded its operations as of 30 June 2025 and started its transition to the World Vision Romania - Moldova Branch to lead future development programming.



WV UCR Phase 2 Strategy 2024-2026 continues the main Phase 1 directions by integrating humanitarian responses with early recovery and economic development interventions in joint programming with VisionFund, WV's microfinance subsidiary.

Close out of Moldova office is a part of World Vision's broader regional strategy to adapt to changes in the funding and to transition from emergency response to long-term development focusing on its response inside Ukraine.




People reached by Sector
