# MIDDLE EAST AND EASTERN EUROPE

REGIONAL BRIEF FY 2025



World Vision has been serving the most vulnerable children across the Middle East and Eastern Europe (MEER) region for the past 50 years. We are leading the way in highly fragile contexts to ensure the most vulnerable children in the hardest-to-reach places are supported - including children on the move and those affected by violence, crisis, and climate change. We currently work alongside local partners responding to humanitarian crises and operating long-term development projects in 15 countries and territories across the region, including Albania, Armenia, Georgia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Romania, Ukraine, Moldova, Iraq, the West Bank, Lebanon, Yemen, Syria, Jordan, Türkiye, and Afghanistan.

Amid ongoing conflict, displacement, overlapping crises, and worsening climate shocks, humanitarian needs across the region are soaring – with over 74 million people, including countless children, relying on humanitarian aid in 2025. In response, World Vision is prioritising child protection, MHPSS and education, livelihoods, health and nutrition, water and sanitation, cash and food assistance, as well as climate-smart initiatives. Through our global ENOUGH campaign, we are working to end child hunger and food insecurity, tackle malnutrition, and ensure that children and young people have access to healthy school meals and kitchens.

We cannot do it alone. Localisation remains at the heart of our approach – empowering local actors to lead response, recovery, rehabilitation, and long-term development in their own contexts. By investing in their capacity and leadership, we strengthen our collective ability to ensure that every girl and boy has what they need to live life in all its fullness. We collaborate closely with supporters, governments, local communities, faith leaders, civil society, faith-based organisations, as well as children and young people, to ensure that the most vulnerable can receive the support they need.


