

For more than 70 years, World Vision has served children, families and communities in nearly 100 countries, motivated by our Christian faith and a vision of “every child life in all its fullness.” We partner with the most vulnerable, regardless of religion, race, ethnicity or gender, to overcome poverty and injustice – in emergencies and in long-term development.

World Vision started working in Ukraine in March 2022 through 6 and now 3 active offices in Ukraine (Kyiv, Dnipro, Mykolaiv), which currently support aid efforts reaching conflict-affected people.

While also supported Ukrainian refugees and host communities in Moldova, Romania, and Georgia. WV UCR in Moldova concluded its operations in June 2025 and transitioned to WV Romania registered Moldova Foundation.

Since the onset of the crisis, World Vision's Ukraine response and its local partners have reached over 2.3 million people, including more than 1 million children, providing essential support through food, non-food items, cash assistance, protection and education interventions, livelihood, and mental health & psychosocial support programming.

World Vision continues to actively respond to Ukraine's ongoing needs, reaching 22 of the 24 regions and delivering both immediate emergency relief and sustainable long-term recovery.



OUR STRATEGIC OBJECTIVES

1. Early recovery and economic development opportunities are created for IDP and refugee households, as well as host communities for improved and self-reliant livelihood.
2. Children, their families and communities benefit from enhanced social protection mechanisms and education opportunities in Ukraine and host countries.
3. Basic needs of vulnerable children, families and communities affected by the war are met in Ukraine and host countries.
4. Equitable and complementary partnerships with national and local actors are encultured and promoted to enable them take stronger leadership role in delivering the humanitarian response and managing the transition to rehabilitation and development.

In 2025, World Vision intentionally incorporated early recovery and economic development into its programming, expanding livelihood opportunities for affected families.

Its microfinance arm, VisionFund, began operating in Ukraine. It started the medium- to long-term recovery and development via financing small and medium-sized businesses for further growth, opportunities to generate income and create new jobs.

World Vision prioritizes localizing its Ukraine response by empowering local actors and supporting transition to rehabilitation and long-term development.

OUR PRIORITY SECTORS IN UKRAINE (2022-2025)

LIVELIHOODS

World Vision remains committed to delivering essential, life-saving support while increasingly integrating early recovery and durable solutions approaches to protect and restore household incomes for vulnerable families.



World Vision's livelihoods programming in Ukraine is built around three key models:

- Building Secure Livelihoods 2.0
- Graduation Approach
- Microfinance

15,369 people underwent professional training, including 634 in 2025

331 people received \$357,661 cash to start or develop a business

CHILD PROTECTION

World Vision has implemented extensive child protection programming across Ukraine reaching over 239,000 people since 2022. The services include mental health and psychosocial support (MHPSS), positive parenting, and recreational activities in Child Friendly Spaces.



865 people went through child protection community level programming

643 people trained on child protection topics (including 33 in 2025)

90,468 children have been provided with a safe environment (including 2,515 in 2025)

147 Child Friendly Spaces are fully operational in Ukraine

EDUCATION

World Vision's Education in Emergencies programme has achieved key milestones, including distributing educational materials, providing life skills and psychosocial support, training teachers, and offering catch-up programmes for children who have lost access to schooling.



242,156 children reached with comprehensive education programming in Ukraine (including 1,036 in 2025)

CASH ASSISTANCE

World Vision's cash and voucher assistance (CVA) helps displaced and vulnerable families in Ukraine by providing flexible aid to purchase essentials and support during harsh winters, while also stimulating local economies.



\$55,458,252 value of cash distributed across Ukraine (including \$6,582,585 in 2025)

236,287 people benefited from cash assistance (including 26,427 in 2025)

MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHOSOCIAL SUPPORT



World Vision prioritizes integrating child-centered, community-based Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) within its education, child protection and livelihood programmes.

Key interventions include Child Friendly Spaces and Play and Learning Hubs, Psychological First Aid, and Problem Management Plus (PM+) for adults. Additionally, World Vision collaborates with local partners to deploy multidisciplinary mobile teams to reach isolated areas.

155,048 people participated in psychosocial support services (including 16,856 in 2025)

1,989 parents underwent positive parenting sessions (including 352 in 2025)

10,323 people reached by community resilient programming (including 8,413 in 2025)

1,273 faith leaders trained in Psychological First Aid (including 206 in 2025)

BASIC NEEDS ASSISTANCE & WINTERISATION



World Vision is addressing the urgent needs of Ukrainian families through three main approaches:

- Cash Assistance
- Alternative Energy Solutions
- Winterisation Kits

150,879 non-food kits distributed across Ukraine (including 14,600 in 2025)

344,007 people supported with non-food assistance (including 29,451 in 2025)

458,167 people benefited from food assistance

LOCALISATION & PARTNERSHIPS



From the outset of the World Vision Ukraine Crisis Response (WV UCR), localisation has been a core strategic objective.

41 local and international partners in Ukraine

85% projects in Ukraine implemented with local partners (2025)

37% WVUCR field budget allocated to local partners

142 demand-driven training sessions delivered in 2025 to local partners
