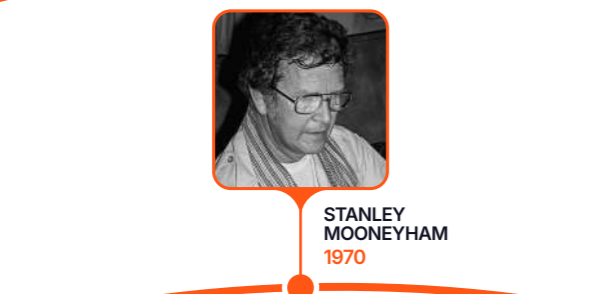

World Vision's engagement in Cambodia began during the civil war, a time when families faced fear, displacement, and urgent humanitarian needs. President Dr. Stan Mooneyham led a convoy of medical supplies and emergency assistance to Phnom Penh, marking the organization's first presence in the country.

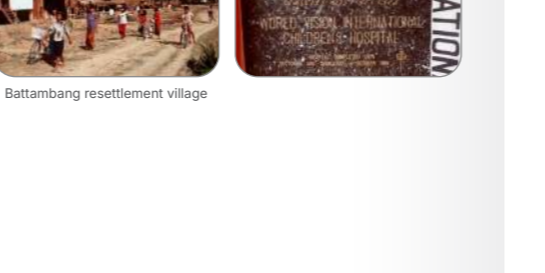
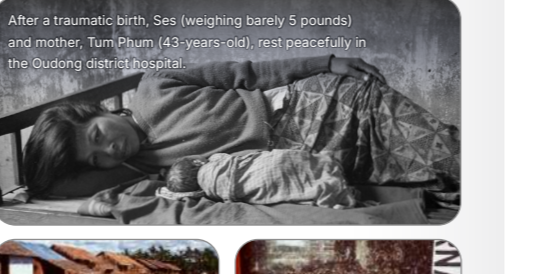

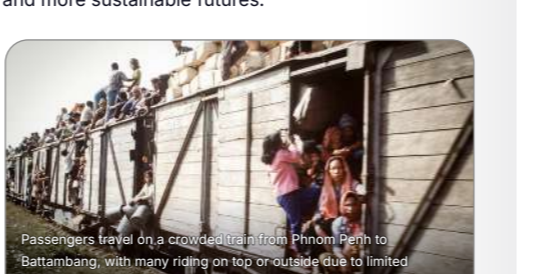

**TRANSITION FROM RELIEF TO DEVELOPMENT**

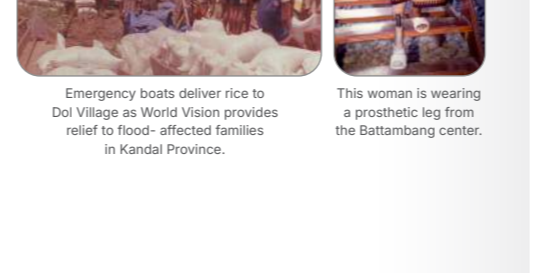
1990-1995 — Transition from Relief to Development World Vision transitioned from post-crisis recovery to long-term development programming. Key initiatives expanded to include health and nutrition services with a focus on maternal and child survival, food security, microfinance, mine clearance, and HIV/AIDS awareness—supporting communities in building safer and more sustainable futures.



**1995 - 2005**

**STRENGTHENING COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS**

Through the Child Sponsorship Programme and Area Development Programmes, World Vision strengthened partnerships with local communities. Interventions in health, education, infrastructure, livelihoods, mine clearance with gender and disability inclusion, savings groups, rice banks, HIV and AIDS prevention and care, and livestock initiatives contributed to improved resilience and quality of life.

**PROMOTING HOLISTIC TRANSFORMATION DEVELOPMENT**

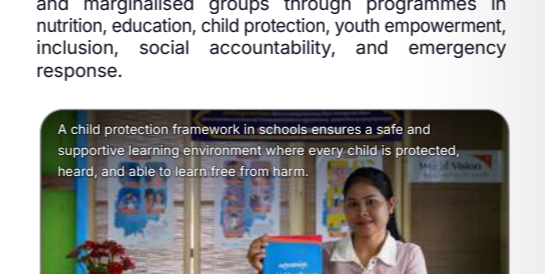

**ENHANCING PROGRAMME QUALITY IN ALIGNMENT WITH GOVERNMENT STRATEGIES AND SDGs**

World Vision aligned its work more closely with national priorities and the Sustainable Development Goals. Programmes prioritised the most vulnerable children and expanded its impact to reach vulnerable children and marginalised groups through programmes in nutrition, education, child protection, youth empowerment, inclusion, social accountability, and emergency response.

**RESPONDING TO COVID-19**

In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, World Vision rapidly adapted its programming to protect children and families. The response reached over one million people in Cambodia, supporting communities to remain informed, safe, and resilient.
