# Be part of our impact

**World Vision is a global humanitarian and development organisation dedicated to addressing the needs of children and communities around the world and has been operating in East Asia for almost 70 years.**

We have proven local expertise in countries that we operate, with 95% of our teams comprising of local staff bringing deep contextual understanding, trusted community networks and cultural understanding to our work. This promotes sustainable change that addresses grassroots needs and solutions.



## 01. Partner with communities to tackle the root cause of hardship and inequity.

### Environmental Stewardship and Climate Action

We build and strengthen communities' capacity to mitigate the impacts of climate change through sustainable farming, disaster risk planning, education, energy efficiency and renewable energy, natural resource management and waste management initiatives.

**We directly supported 329,599 people with our Disaster Risk Reduction and Climate Action work last year. This included:**



In Mongolia, delivering lifesaving support to herder families during dzud and protect livelihoods with emergency livestock feed, cash assistance, and essential items.



Introducing Farmer Managed Natural Regeneration (FMNR) to restore degraded landscapes, enhance biodiversity, and improve livelihoods.

### Water, Sanitation and Hygiene

We build water systems, toilets and hygiene facilities to help communities reduce disease, improve productivity, and achieve long-term water security.

**Last year, we directly supported 416,829 people through our programs in East Asia with Water, Sanitation and Hygiene projects, including communities in crisis.**



In Myanmar, Cambodia and Vietnam, we worked with corporate partners such as Procter & Gamble to reduce the prevalence of waterborne diseases among children and communities by ensuring the clean water access.

### Education

World Vision addresses the foundational learning crisis by strengthening early childhood and basic education systems that shape a child's future. Our integrated approach builds literacy, life skills, and emotional resilience, while equipping teachers to deliver quality, inclusive education.

**Last year, we directly supported 523,279 people through our Education programs in East Asia**



In Cambodia, 197,211 children participated in inclusive education initiatives, with 14,378 previously out-of-school children reintegrated through interventions such as school meals, teacher training, and reading camps.

### Gender and Social Inclusion

We work with communities to understand what drives exclusion, then to break down these barriers and create lasting change. This helps people build stronger, more equitable societies, improves access to services and create an environment where everyone can reach their full potential.

**Thousands benefit from our gender and social inclusion initiatives each year. Last year, we supported 25,115 children with disability inclusion.**



In China, World Vision focuses on disability inclusion by establishing safe, child-led groups to boost confidence and advocacy skills. The organization supports children with disabilities through rehabilitation, education, and social services.



### Health and Nutrition

We are making a difference through improved healthcare, immunisations and nutrition. Our efforts focus on ensuring children have access to nutritious food and advocating for the funding and political commitment needed to end child and maternal hunger and malnutrition. Our goal is to eliminate hunger, stunting and wasting across the region.

**Last year, our health and nutrition programs supported 419,162 children across Southeast Asia.**



In Laos, World Vision launched the SUAN project to promote Nutrition-Sensitive Climate-Smart Agriculture in three districts of Salavan Province. In partnership with local authorities, the initiative aims to improve nutrition, food security, and climate resilience for over 8,000 people, particularly women, children, and people with disabilities.

### Protection and recognised rights for children impacted by migration and displacement

We protect the rights and wellbeing of children affected by migration by promoting safe and dignified pathways, strengthening child protection systems, and expanding access to essential services. Through strong community engagement and child and youth participation, we empower migrant and displaced children and families to shape their own futures.

**Last year, our migration programs supported 111,511 people across East Asia.**



In Thailand, the Reaching Women Migrant Workers and their Families in Construction Camps project supported 1,000 workers living in construction camps across Thailand. Funded by the International Labour Organisation, this initiative ensured that migrant families gained access to essential education and health services, and that their rights were better protected.

## 02. Provide emergency assistance to children and families affected by natural disasters, health emergencies and disruptive conflict.



World Vision is a frontline partner when emergencies hit. We provide urgent relief, such as food, water, shelter, and essentials, while laying the groundwork for long-term recovery, backed by decades of global experience and trusted local networks. We help children, families, and communities recover and rebuild after a disaster. In the aftermath of a disaster, we work with communities on livelihood recovery to help them rebuild lives as quickly as possible.

**Last year we responded to 19 emergencies in our operations in East Asia. Our work helped 943,736 people, including 310,852 children impacted by floods, earthquakes, cyclones, landslides, conflict and refugee crises.**

## Disaster Response



### Adaptive Earthquake Response Improves Recovery in Myanmar

One year after the earthquake, World Vision has reached over 500,000 people, including 194,748 children, with integrated support across emergency relief, education, protection, health, WASH, and livelihoods recovery.

Through its microfinance arm, more than USD 2.5 million in recovery loans have been disbursed to 6,500 affected households and small businesses (89% women), restoring financial access and accelerating recovery.



### Cambodia: Reaching Families Displaced from Home

World Vision Cambodia has been supporting families displaced by the border tensions across provinces including Banteay Meanchey, Preah Vihear, Siem Reap, Battambang, and Oddar Meanchey.

As of January 2026, approximately 140,000 people have been reached, including 50,000 children, as well as pregnant and breastfeeding women, older persons, and people living with disabilities.



### Thailand: Flood Relief, Protection, and the Path to Recovery

From November 2025 to February 2026, World Vision Foundation of Thailand delivered a flood response in Songkhla Province, reaching more than 21,539 people, including 3,729 children, through relief items, food support, and evacuation centre assistance.

A second phase supported 1,700 vulnerable households across four districts, prioritizing bedridden patients and elderly households, and provided 130 sets of student desks and chairs to eight affected schools, benefiting over 600 students.

## A Partnership Built for Impact: World Vision & CITI Foundation

Supported by World Vision Thailand and the Citi Foundation, the Youth Innovation for a Sustainable Environment (Trash2Cash) initiative enabled youth leaders to implement the Nong Salut Zero Waste Project, embedding waste segregation, recycling, and circular economy practices within a school setting. The project reduced plastic waste at source while converting recyclables, such as used school milk bags, into new, functional products.

By combining behavior change, student leadership, and practical climate action, the initiative delivered measurable environmental impact and long-term sustainability outcomes. Its innovation and results were recognized with the **2024 Climate Change and Environmental Youth Network Award (Silver Medal)** from Thailand's Department of Climate Change and Environment.
