Humanitarian Response to the Displacement Crisis Along the Cambodia–Thailand Border

SITUATION OVERVIEW

Of the more than 640,000 people originally displaced, 20,923 people, including 10,674 women and 6,066 children, remain unable to return because their villages and homes continue to be occupied or damaged¹, according to the Press Release on the Situation of Displaced Persons and Impact on Civilian Areas as of the Morning of 8 July 2026.

While returns continue, access to essential services remains constrained in some affected areas. Across Oddar Meanchey, Banteay Meanchey, and Preah Vihear provinces, 20 schools and eight health facilities remain temporarily unavailable, limiting communities' access to education and essential healthcare services.

The Government of Cambodia has constructed more than 4,000 temporary shelters to accommodate displaced families affected by the Cambodia–Thailand border situation in Preah Vihear and Banteay Meanchey provinces². These shelters are intended for approximately 4,000 families who remain unable to return to their places of origin. While the new shelters provide safer accommodation, families continue to require support to restore their livelihoods and strengthen access to education, child protection, water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), and other essential services.

HUMANITARIAN NEEDS

As the situation evolves from a mass displacement emergency to a more complex recovery phase, the following priority humanitarian needs have been identified:

- **Education:** While 20 schools remain closed, temporary learning activities continue in displacement sites, with further support needed to sustain children's access to education.
- **Protection:** Living conditions in some areas remain challenging, highlighting the need for continued support to ensure safe and appropriate environments for communities.
- **WASH:** Water, sanitation, and hygiene facilities continue to require additional support to meet the needs of affected communities.
- **Food and Nutrition:** Some families continue to need support to maintain adequate food and nutrition, with supplementary feeding programmes ongoing.
- **Health:** Eight health centres remain unable to operate across the three provinces, affecting communities' access to primary healthcare, immunisation, and referral services in some areas.

The response continues to support families who have moved to new locations and those remaining in displacement sites, focusing on both immediate needs and longer-term recovery.

Since the early stages of the displacement response following the Cambodia–Thailand border situation, World Vision International in Cambodia has been supporting affected communities with essential services, with a focus on health and nutrition, WASH, education, protection and psychosocial support, cash assistance, and the provision of food and non-food items across Banteay Meanchey, Battambang, Oddar Meanchey, Siem Reap, and Preah Vihear provinces.

As of June 2026, World Vision has mobilised USD 1.8 million to support 40,158 families, reaching **101,016 adults** (including 59,375 women) and **46,385 children** (including 22,912 girls).

Education

World Vision distributed 11,584 learning kits (each containing a backpack, exercise books, pens, pencils, and rulers), 53,146 teaching and learning materials, 6,862 uniforms, and 170 bicycles to displaced students and teachers who are learning and teaching in temporary learning spaces across displacement sites.

World Vision supported 1,982 families for multi-purpose cash assistance (each family received USD 100). Through public and private partnerships and corporate donation, World Vision distributed 1,893 family food assistance kits and supported food security initiatives, including kitchen gardening, duck raising, and refreshment program in 18 displacement sites. World Vision continues to support 330 agricultural kits, 50 food kits to displaced households residing at temporary relocation sites. 2,301 affected families received cash vouchers to purchase food items during the Khmer New Year.



Protection & Psychosocial Support

World Vision established 53 child-friendly spaces and 34 feedback and complaint mechanisms. In collaboration with Transcultural Psychosocial Organization (TPO) Cambodia, World Vision also provide psychosocial support to 8,067 community members and 11,973 girls and boys.

Health and Nutrition

World Vision distributed 6,000 supplementary feeding and micronutrient support kits to 4,400 children under five and 1,600 pregnant and lactating women, including 200 postpartum mothers.

World Vision also provided three motorbikes to a health centre to support health staff in reaching remote resettlement communities through home visits, follow-up services, and nutrition monitoring. In addition, World Vision is supporting the construction of a health centre building in Preah Vihear Province and providing essential supplies, including gloves and folding sleeping chairs, to health posts in displacement sites.

Shelter/Non-Food Items

30 sets of solar lights were installed across resettlement sites, reaching more than 12,000 families, including women and children.



Water, Sanitation and Hygiene (WASH)

World Vision drilled and established five boreholes in communities and temporary schools in Svay Chek District. Five additional drinking water treatment systems were installed in Banteay Ampil and Choam Khsan districts, benefiting 10,640 people.

At household level, 487,680 P&G water purification sachets were distributed to 2,032 households in Oddar Meanchey Province, while 400 water jars were provided to families at resettlement sites in Banteay Meanchey Province. Sanitation facilities were further improved through the construction and rehabilitation of four latrine blocks with 23 stalls across Svay Chek, Thmar Pouk, and Banteay Ampil districts, benefiting 2,045 people.

In Oddar Meanchey Province, World Vision installed two solar-powered water pumping systems to support community gardening and improve water access for 643 families (2,174 people).

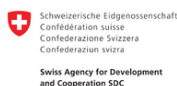


Humanitarian Partnership

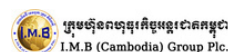
