A Report on progress made by Adolescent Girls and Young Women project



While there have been achievements in tackling HIV/AIDS for adolescent girls and young women, there are still challenges to be addressed. HIV remains one of the leading causes of death worldwide for women aged between 15 and 44.

It is in view of the above that World Vision Malawi, with funding from Action Aid, is implementing an Adolescent Girls and Young Women project aimed at reducing the incidences of HIV among adolescent girls and young women aged 15 to 24 in Mangochi.

According to the Demographic Health Survey Report (2015), 8.8% of women aged 15-49 and men aged 15-49 in Malawi are infected with HIV; HIV prevalence is higher among women than men (10.8% versus 6.4%). HIV prevalence is highest in the Southern region (12.8%), where it is more than twice as high as is in the Central (5.6%) and Northern (5.1%) regions.

PROJECT DURATION

The project runs from January to December 2017 covering Seven Traditional Authorities namely: Chilipa, Chimwala, Mponda, Nankumba, Chowe, Bwananyambi and Jalasi. The project further covers 13 Education zones of Boma, Koche, Nkope, Monkey Bay, Chimwala, Chilipa, Masongola, Mkumba, Khungwa, Malombe, Namisi, Chiponde and Thema.

PROJECT INTERVENTIONS

Among other things, the project is implementing the following initiatives

- Capacity building of School and Community Structures, such as, In and Out of school youths clubs, Mother Groups, School Matrons, School Management Committees and Parents-Teachers Associations in School related Gender Based Violence,
- Reinforcement of Teachers Code of Conduct Compliance
- Menstrual hygiene management including production of sanitary pads
- Village Saving Loan and Vocational Skills.
- Dissemination of Health and HIV Messages using various strategies including airing of jingles at local radio stations including

- 163 in school and 200 out of school girl clubs established to promote girls health issues
- 80622 in-school and 33999 out-of-school girls have received sex and sexuality related education messages

- 893 mother groups members trained in comprehensive Sexual and Reproductive Health (SRH)
- 652 schools health days conducted
- GBV, HTC and Sexuality messages disseminated in 163 schools during school health days for three times.
- 7598 in school tested positivity rate is 0.58% for in school
- 3743 out of school tested Positivity rate is 3.3 for out of school
- young students tested for HIV and tested positive
- 825 Peer Educators for out of school girls clubs trained in life skills.
