



Why BabyWASH?

BabyWASH is how we describe the integration between water sanitation and hygiene (WASH), early childhood development (ECD), nutrition, and maternal newborn and child health (MNCH) interventions to improve child well-being in the first 1000 days. By working together through integrated BabyWASH interventions, we can end many preventable deaths and:

- Save 31,000 mothers and 420,000 babies each year through more hygienic birth practices. (WHO 2014)
- Reduce the 45% of child deaths each year linked to malnutrition. (WHO 2016)
- Reduce the 50% of malnutrition associated with unsafe water, inadequate sanitation, or insufficient hygiene. (WHO 2008)
- Reduce diarrhoea rates by 30-40% through proven hygiene practices. (WHO 2014)
- Reduce risk of neonatal mortality by 44% by early initiation of breastfeeding. (Lancet 2014)

- assist with piloting materials at country level and securing funding where necessary

History

The BabyWASH Coalition began with the realisation that WASH is often missing from nutrition, ECD, and MNCH programming. There is a growing evidence base on the need for WASH to play a key role in nutrition programming, and emerging evidence on the links between WASH, MNCH and ECD, yet movement towards more integrated programmes has been slow because policy, funding, organisational structures and attitudinal barriers often get in the way.

In December 2015, World Vision and WaterAid convened a meeting to discuss this lack of integration. Representatives from non-governmental organisations, donor agencies, multilaterals and academic institutions sat down to discuss the current evidence and to begin defining the key gaps. The BabyWASH Coalition, focused around sector integration to improve child well-being in the first 1000 days, was established to help fill these defined gaps.

Main Coalition Objectives

1) Develop and disseminate lessons and guidance for programme integration

Besides being a source of information and case studies of successful integration, the Coalition will create a toolkit for programme implementers on how to successfully integrate BabyWASH interventions into their programming and work collaboratively with other sectors and organisations.

2) Define integration metrics

It is impossible to measure the success of integration without proper metrics. The Coalition will use current research and success stories to define the key components and metrics of beneficial integration. Where appropriate, the Coalition will assist in planning pilot programmes to validate metrics.

3) Advocate for stronger focus on integrated care in the first 1,000 days of life

The Coalition will use case studies and evidence to advocate for more integration between sectors. Funders and policy-makers will be targeted to minimise current barriers to integration.
