## "The Vulnerability Report" released

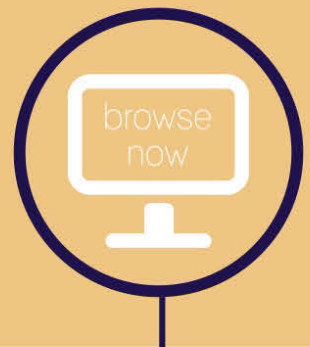

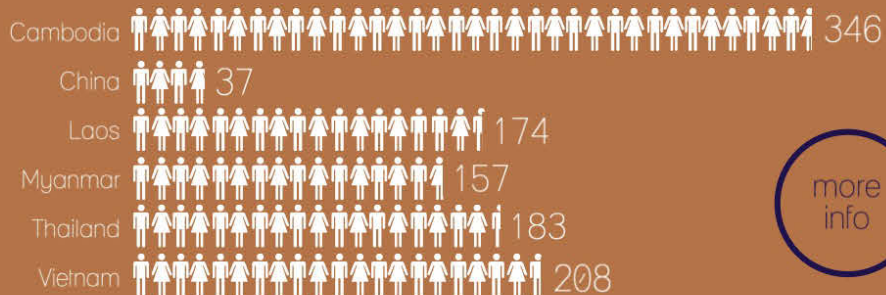

## Cambodia

Partnered with 17 Triggers to develop, test and implement behavior change communication messages. 17 Triggers conducted a workshop with all ETIP Cambodia staff, as well as staff from Laos, Thailand and Vietnam to strengthen the capacity to analyse situations at the local level to understand the attitudes, triggers and channels for facilitating behavior change. The final tools and concept for implementation will be developed by March 2015.

## China

Trafficking prevention group was established in Luchun. The ETIP China team developed a strategy given the restricted context, and will use it as a model for other trafficking groups. The team is working on training guidance specific to China as well as a home visitor handbook which will be completed in May 2015

## Laos

18 youth clubs have been established using the Smart Navigator Toolkit to train volunteer adult facilitators. There have also been 5 more child protection network groups established. These groups are using the child protection network manual developed by the government to create conversation about child protection issues within target communities.

## Vietnam

135 youth from ETIP youth clubs in Tran Yen participated in the youth forum which was co-organized by the District Labour Department in July 2014. "Actions for a society of non-violence and abuse to children" was the topic of the forum calling for collaboration, responsibility and awareness about the importance of child protection and support from organizations and community members.

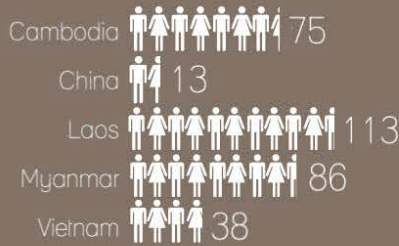
## Myanmar

Awareness raising events, including the AMTZ Kyaut Taw Gyi pagoda festival in October where a total of 14,786 participants received messages of safe migration and anti-human trafficking. In November, ETIP Myanmar in Hpa-An celebrated Kayin State Day by conducting an anti-trafficking exhibition which had a total of 5,000 participants in attendance. In December, during Shan New Year, Kyein Tung set up a 5 day anti-trafficking exhibition where 3,260 participants attended.

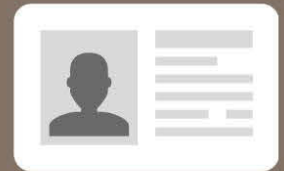

## Cambodia

World Vision held an "assessment workshop" jointly with UN ACT and IOM on 11-12 December 2014 in Phnom Penh. There were 70 participants from 33 NGOs at the workshop. Participants mapped existing protection services in the country and identified two existing referral systems, which are facilitated by IOM and Chab Dai coalition, adding to the repatriation flow currently being developed by government and NGO partners.

## Vietnam

World Vision adopted the support group model developed by IOM and training was conducted in Yen Bai province in November 2014. There were 32 participants from the Women Union and Division of Labor, Invalid and Social Affairs at provincial and district and commune level of Yen Bai province. Participants were provided with basic knowledge of the self-help group model, guideline on how to establish self-help groups, organize self-help group meetings, and monitor and assess this model.

# POLICY PILLAR

## Cambodia

In October the ETIP Policy Manager presented the COMMIT Youth Forum proposals to the COMMIT Task Force in Cambodia. The task force has accepted all recommendations and agreed to immediately start inviting youth representatives to its meetings.

## Laos

In November ETIP held a meeting of civil society organisations and collected their views and recommendations for the 7th ASEAN Forum on Migrant Labour in cooperation with the Task Force on ASEAN Migrant Labour. This input was later fed into the regional preparatory meeting of CSOs prior to the 7th AFML and became part of the CSO recommendations at the Forum.

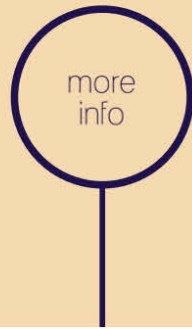
## Myanmar



In August, survivors were trained as spokespersons and shared their experiences and challenges with senior authorities and Noble prize winner Aung San Suu Kyi. Recommendations from survivor were developed and shared with policy makers and partners. Based on these discussions, ETIP developed policy recommendations for protection, prevention, and the prosecution process, which were presented to government, partner agencies, and the public at Myanmar's Anti-trafficking Day ceremony on 13 September 2014 in Nay Pyi Taw.

## China

A study tour to Hong Kong was conducted from October 17-26 with participants from All China Women's Federation, Ministry of Public Security, and Ministry of Civil Affairs in Anhui and Sichuan provinces. The purpose was to introduce participants to the referral mechanism used in child protection cases. After the visit, participants prioritised the development of practical guidance on the national referral mechanism for human trafficking issues.



## Thailand

World Vision co-organised the COMMIT Youth Forum. ETIP Thailand supported the participation of a total of 44 young people from different locations. The objective of this forum was to select youth representatives to participate in SOM10 in Phnom Penh in April 2015. World Vision partnered with Save the Children, ILO and National Council for Child and Youth Development under the Royal Patronage of HRH Princess Mahachakri Sirindhorn (NCYD) in the organisation of this event.

## Vietnam

In August 2014 ETIP shared video at a victim-gathering event in Quang Tri Province and called on members of the anti-trafficking network to jointly organize a similar event at the national level in 2015. Hagar, Reach, and UNACT committed to hold the event and to invite COMMIT Task Force members to attend and hold dialogues with victims.
