


Key messages

- Families facing starvation:** More than 12 million children go to bed hungry across South Sudan, Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya everyday. Children don't have enough to eat because of various crises – drought, conflict, flooding or hyperinflation.
- Children on the move:** Natural disasters and conflict has forced 8.5 million people to flee their homes across South Sudan, Somalia, Ethiopia and Kenya. Conflict is the largest driver of displacement – with children often witnessing or experiencing horrific violence, exploitation and abuse.
- Malnutrition epidemic:** 9 million children under age 5, pregnant women and breastfeeding mothers require nutrition assistance and without it children's growth and health will be irreversibly damaged.
- Children at risk:** When families don't have the ability to grow or purchase food, children pay the price. Increased hunger forces younger girls into early marriage, makes children drop out of school, pushes boys and girls into child labour and other dangerous ways of surviving, thus dimming their opportunities for the future.
- Flooding and tropical storm aftermath:** An estimated 2.2 million people are struggling to recover after Tropical Storm Sagar devastated parts of Somaliland and Ethiopia; and flooding wreaked havoc on wide areas of Somalia, Kenya and Ethiopia. Crops have been destroyed and animals killed, leading to concerns about a lack of food in months to come.
- Response ongoing:** World Vision is responding to the needs of families in crises in South Sudan, Ethiopia, Kenya and Somalia, reaching more than a million people in June 2018 alone. Still, large-scale, long-term lifesaving assistance is needed to avoid spikes in malnutrition and death. World Vision is appealing for an additional \$58.8 million to increase its response.

Gaps and needs

- More than 818,000 people are displaced in two World Vision programmes, as a result of widespread ethnic violence and border conflicts in Ethiopia, with women and children making up the majority of those who are homeless. Due to the rapidly growing nature of the crisis, World Vision is requesting for additional US\$16 million to assist 411,940 displaced people and expand its programming.
- World Vision Somalia is appealing for US\$1,090,000 to respond to the needs of 102,000 affected by floods and cyclone.


Situation overview

- Ethiopia:** The renewed violence along the border areas of Gedeo and West Guji zones since early June 2018 has led to the displacement reached 818,250. The National Disaster Risk Management Commission (NDRMC) and humanitarian partners have released a prioritized multi-sector response plan for the displacement crisis, urgently seeking US\$117.7 million.
- Kenya:** In June, the Ministry of Health confirmed an outbreak of Rift Valley Fever: Isiolo, Marsabit, Wajir, Tharaka Nithi, Mandera, Lamu, Garissa, Kajiado and Baringo counties were considered high risk having the highest risk of outbreaks. At least 26 people were reported to have died from the disease by the Ministry of Health's Disease Surveillance and Response Unit.
- South Sudan:** The recent peace talks between Government and opposition parties in South Sudan have reached an agreement and conditions included in the peace deal include, permanent ceasefire, cantonments for all forces and the deployment of forces by IGAD and the African Union to safeguard the ceasefire agreement to have three capital cities namely Juba, Wau and Malakal on temporary basis, to host the three proposed vice-presidents.
- Somalia:** The combined effect of the flash flooding and the tropical storm 'Sagar' that occurred in central, southern and north-eastern regions of Somalia has affected an estimated 830,000 people, of which nearly 359,000 have been temporarily displaced. Communities in the coastal areas of Somaliland and Puntland, as well as those along the Jubba and Shebelle rivers are still reeling from the impact of the tropical storm and the flash floods.










