Before going back to China, the police told Lily and her parents that Huang had paid 110,000 RMB (more than US\$17,000) for Lily, most of it borrowed from family and friends. The policeman also wanted to assure Lily and her family that Huang would be brought to justice for what he had done, and that they were searching for Sanda.



Back in her hometown, Lily now works and sings at a small local restaurant. Her friends and family are always around, which is something she loves and never takes for granted. She has written several songs about her experience in China. Her hope is that anyone listening to her songs will become more aware of the dangers out there.

If you visit that small restaurant in Myanmar, it's likely you'll hear someone shout, 'Hey Lily! How about the Freedom Song?' Then a young woman with a guitar will step up onto the small stage and the restaurant will go quiet.
