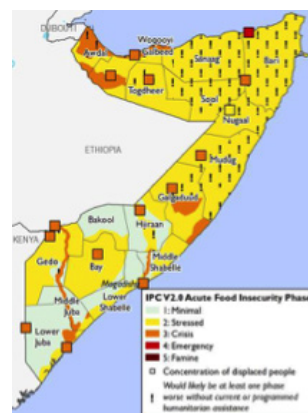


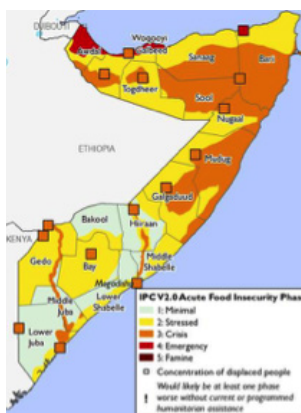
### Key messages

- Humanitarian situation:** The combined effect of the flash flooding and the tropical storm 'Sagar' that occurred in central, southern and north-eastern regions of Somalia has affected an estimated 830,000 people, of which nearly 359,000 have been temporarily displaced. Communities in the coastal areas of Somaliland and Puntland, as well as those along the Jubba and Shebelle rivers are still reeling from the impact of the tropical storm and the flash floods.
- Food security:** Food security has improved significantly in many areas that were previously affected by the prolonged drought. Most areas are considered Stressed (IPC Phase 2) with some pockets still at Crisis (IPC Phase 3), particularly the IDPs and the Guban Pastoralist livelihood zones. However, 5.4 million people still need humanitarian assistance.
- Malnutrition status:** Despite a slight improvement in the general nutritional status in Somalia, an estimated 301,000 children under five years of age are acutely malnourished, including approximately 48,000 children suffering from severe acute malnutrition (SAM). The most at risk are children living in Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) camps.
- Access to water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) and health remains a challenge:** A gradual increase in cases of Acute Water Diarrhoea (AWD)/cholera, measles and malaria cases has been recorded since January 2018 with more than 5,000 cases reported in each of the three diseases. This is partly attributed to the contamination of water sources during floods.
- World Vision continues to respond:** Since the beginning of 2018 World Vision's programme supported 427,027 people, including 163,231 children through our food security, health, nutrition, water and hygiene, education and Gift-in-kind interventions.

Projected food security outcome, June to Sept 2018



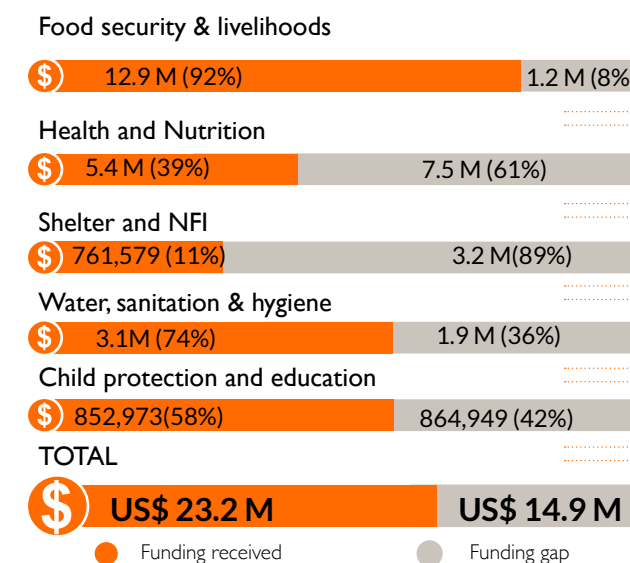
### Gaps and needs

- With 359,000 people displaced by the floods and cyclone across Somalia, the need for urgent shelter, NFI, clean water, food and health is massive. In order to support 102,000 people affected by these floods and the cyclone, World Vision Somalia needs to raise 1,090,000 USD.
- The spike in AWD/ Cholera, measles and malaria is worrying. The need to protect children, and pregnant and lactating mothers is critical in avoiding fatalities. Access to fresh water, mosquito nets and management of waste disposal is important at this time.
- More than 2.6 million people estimated to be internally displaced, the armed standoff and tension between the Somaliland and Puntland in Tukaraq, Sool region is expected to displace more people. This will put more pressure to the already struggling IDP settlements.

### Response highlights

#### FLOODS AND TROPICAL STORM 'SAGAR' RESPONSE



##### FOOD SECURITY AND LIVELIHOODS

- 72,396 people (12,016 households) received cash and food assistance in Dollow, Luuq, Elwak, Baidoa, Wajid, Quansahdhere and Berbera districts.



##### HEALTH

- 1,028 people visited World Vision supported mobile clinics in Belet Weyne, to receive treatment and consultations. The clinics were operated by local partner Zam Foundation.



##### WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

- World Vision provided clean water through water trucking to 10,645 people (1,775 households) in 10 IDP camps in Baidoa. Water provided was (7.5 litres of water per person per day for 15 days). 1,836 people (306 households) participated in various hygiene promotion sessions facilitated by World Vision.



##### SHELTER & NFI

- 600 people (100 households) in Salahley, Awbarkhadle and Dacarta whose villages were destroyed by a mild storm were supported with Non-Food Items (NFI's) through Gifts-In-Kind (GIK). The items included: 10 pieces of fabric, a piece of plastic sheeting, 3 pieces of Jackets, 2 pieces of dining set, 2 pieces of bar soaps and 2 buckets-per a household.

#### HUNGER CRISIS RESPONSE



##### FOOD SECURITY AND LIVELIHOODS

- 99,484 people in South West, Jubbaland, Puntland and Somaliland received cash and food assistance during the month, of these 57,736 were female and 41,748 were male.



##### EDUCATION

- 2,131 school children (1,162 boys and 969 girls) benefited from the supplementary school feeding programme supported by World Vision. 34 teachers in drought-stricken southwest state received US\$100 as an incentive.



##### HEALTH

- Through the 73 health centres and 27 mobile clinics supported by World Vision, 25,429 people received various health services including: out-patience, antenatal, immunization and health education. These included 13,248 children under the age of 5.



##### NUTRITION

- 11,858 children were screened and treated with Severe Acute Malnutrition and Moderate Acute Malnutrition.
- 12,877 adults were also screened, out of which 1,156 were treated with various stages of malnutrition in the health centres, mobile clinics and stabilisation centres supported by World Vision.



##### PROTECTION

- 30 health staff received training on Gender-Based Violence and psychosocial support in Garowe, Eyl and Godobjiran.

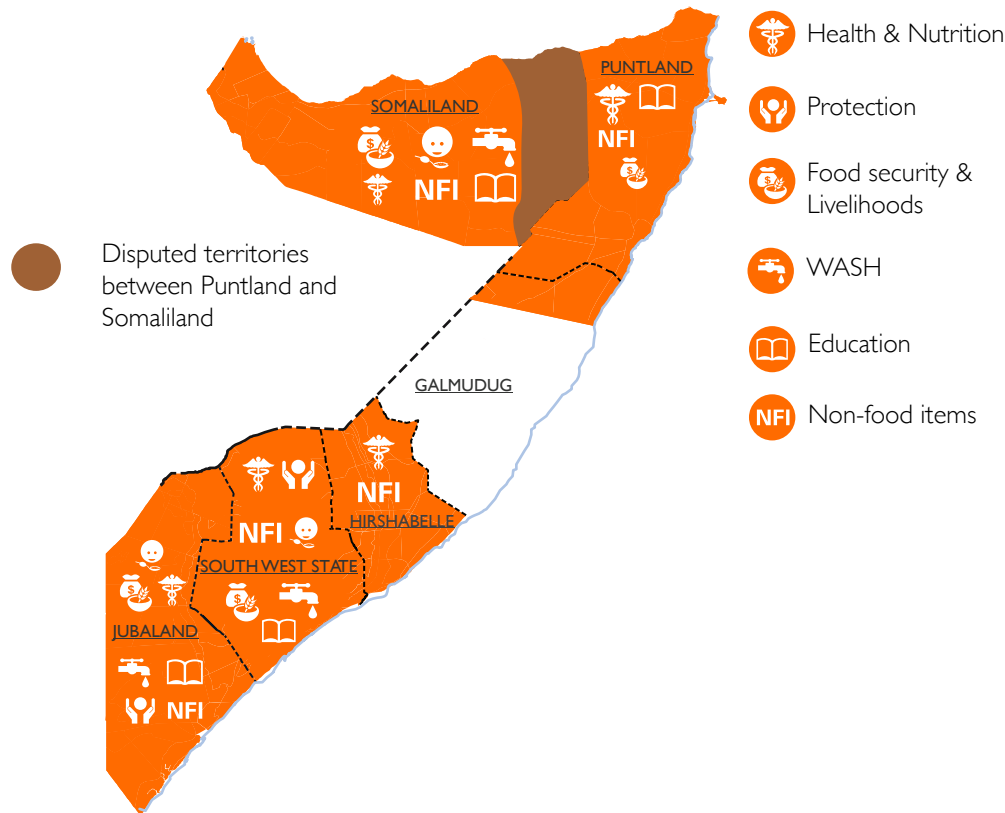

## Response locations



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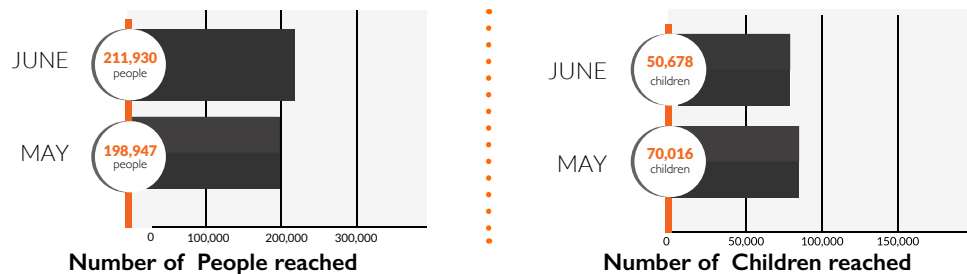
