

### Key messages

- **Overall situation:** An estimated 4.2 million people are in need of humanitarian assistance, 2.5 million are children. Most poor households in Somaliland are still slowly recovering from the widespread damage caused by the cyclone in July 2018.
- **Displacement:** At least 500 newly displaced families arrived in Qansahley IDP camp in Dolow. There are 42,000 other IDP families sheltered across 371 IDP settlements in Baidoa. The new displacements were as a result of increased conflict in Southwest and Jubaland that forced families to flee their homes.
- **Malnutrition:** At least 294,000 children under five years old are at risk of malnutrition, 55,000 of these face Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) and will need appropriate nutrition treatment.
- **WorldVision response:** Since the beginning of 2018, World Vision's response has assisted 1,261,537 people including 590,678 children through food security and livelihoods, health, nutrition, water and hygiene and education programmes.
- **Overall funding situation:** While the income in 2017 was steady throughout the year, due to the continued hunger crisis, spike in disease outbreaks and increase in internal displacements, contributions have been modest in the second half of 2018 as the overall food security situation improved. Despite improvements in the humanitarian situation, continued support from donors will be required to sustain lifesaving assistance early in 2019, alongside scaling livelihood and resilience support.

### Projected food security outcome, October 2018 to January 2019




IPC 2.0 Acute Food Insecurity Phase

1: Minimal 2: Stressed 3: Crisis 4: Emergency 5: Famine


### Gaps and needs

- **Additional funding:** To continue providing critical services to the most vulnerable families in dire need and whose lives and livelihoods are at risk, World Vision requires US\$9.4 million. Funding will go towards providing therapeutic food for nearly 300,000 children facing the threat of malnutrition. Arrival of new IDPs has further overstretched the available resources, hence additional funding will go towards addressing such needs.
- **Sustained funding:** Not just additional funding but sustained funding will help the most vulnerable groups such as those living in IDP settlements without any means of earning income, have a way to provide for their families.

### Response highlights



#### WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

- Some of the interventions included providing water purification tablets in Puntland and drilling and equipping of a borehole in South West state.
- Other activities included hygiene promotion campaigns in Garowe district and South West state, training of WASH committee members in Somaliland.



#### HEALTH

Nearly 60,000 people had access to basic healthcare services across the 13 health centres and 4 mobile clinics run by World Vision. This included 7,147 people who received outpatient treatment, 6,053 under children under five years old who received free medical consultations, 1,971 children immunised and 2,960 pregnant women that received Antenatal Care services.



#### EDUCATION

- To improve their learning experience, 1,639 children (926 boys and 713 girls) across eight schools in Puntland received text and notebooks.
- Additionally, 76 teachers (52 male and 24 female) received incentives, 15 others from two schools in Eyl district were trained on managing gender-based violence in two schools.



#### FOOD SECURITY & LIVELIHOODS

- 5,166 families (30,996 people) in Dangorayo, Godobjiran, Eyl and Garowe districts of Puntland received vouchers (electronic) that they redeemed in exchange for food commodities.
- In Jubaland, 750 people received food vouchers. In addition, 5,666 people in Dolow received cash through the cash transfer programme. 6,516 people in Luuq, Dolow and Elwak were supported with food vouchers.
- In Somaliland, 22,366 families (134,196 people) received cash through the cash transfer programme, while 220 through the cash for work programme.



#### NUTRITION

13,385, children under five years old in Puntland and South West state were screened for malnutrition. Of these, 582 children had Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM), with 11 cases of complications. 7,040 had Moderately Acute Malnutrition (MAM). The cases were treated and managed at the various health centres and mobile nutrition clinics run by World Vision.



#### PROTECTION

In Somaliland 750 people (450 girls) participated in a dialogue session on protection issues with community leaders. 32 people, including 14 partners from South West state, were trained on child protection measures.




