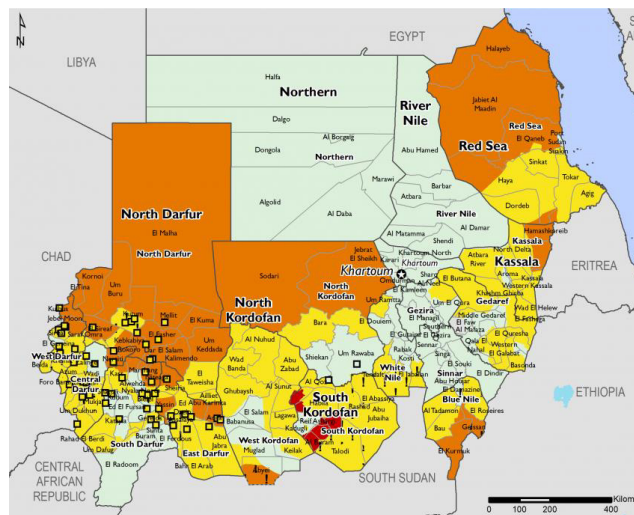


### Key messages

- **Overall humanitarian situation:** An estimated 5.5 million people are in need of humanitarian assistance in Sudan according to the 2018 Humanitarian Needs Overview (2018 HNO). Of these, 3.1 million people are in the Darfur region. The emergency situation in Sudan continues to affect people's ability to be productive and be self sufficient.
- **Flash floods expected:** According to the Sudan Meteorological Authority (SMA) 2018 Rainfall Outlook report heavy rainfall is expected in Blue Nile state (southeast of Sudan) during the month of September. This is likely to cause flash floods in some parts of the Blue Nile including the capital, Damazine. Accordingly, preparedness plans for the rainy season have been reactivated and World Vision WV is prepared to participate in joint efforts such as floods assessments and responses.
- **Outbreak of diseases:** Disease outbreak like Acute Watery Diarrhoea is commonplace during the rainy season (June to September) and World Vision is actively engaged in the WASH sector cluster, providing technical support in the areas of operation.
- **Refugees' response:** World Vision continues to respond to the needs of South Sudanese and Central African Republic refugees hosted in Bielel, Al Radom, Al Salam and Buram localities. Support is mainly lifesaving assistance targeting 27,000 refugees.
- **World Vision response:** World Vision has embarked on community-based school enrolment campaigns in partnership with the Ministry of Education (MoE) and UNICEF with the aim of registering school-aged children and out-of-school children to access basic education.

June - September 2018

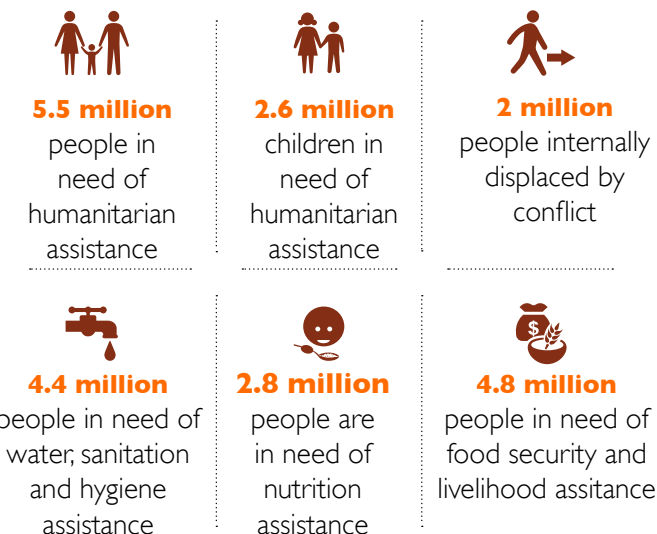

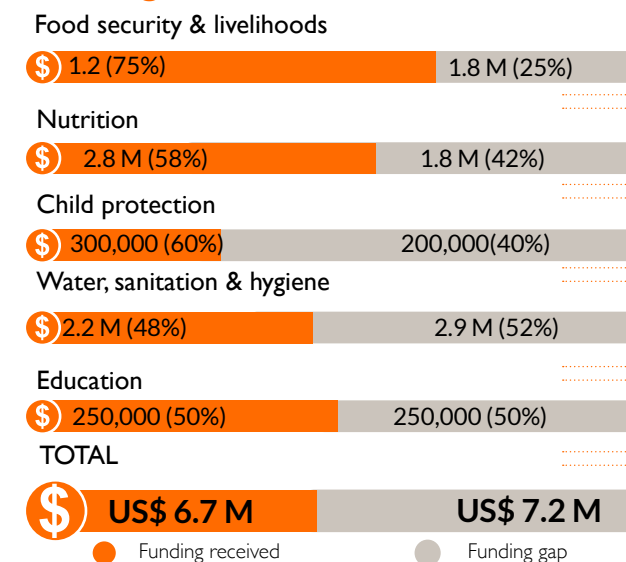
### Gaps and needs

- **Funding in new areas of operation:** World Vision has recently started operations in South Kordofan and East Darfur states, targeting IDP, Refugees, returnees and host communities with critical services like health and nutrition, provision of clean water, sanitation and hygiene services, and livelihoods support. US\$2.95 million is required to meet the needs of those targeted.
- **Support for returnees:** In August, an inter-agency assessment conducted in some localities in East Darfur found that some families have returned from Nyala and Asalam IDP camps in South Darfur where they have been living for years. They are in need of urgent support to meet their basic needs such as water sanitation and hygiene, and livelihoods to enable them become self-reliant in future.

### Response highlights



#### FOOD SECURITY AND LIVELIHOODS

- **Farmers' trainings:** 56 Community Extension Workers from 22 targeted communities received training as Trainers of Trainers (ToT) to promote seed banking system, use of organic fertilizer, compost making and use, and seed multiplication.
- **Support for livestock farmers:** 3,747 livestock belonging to 1,245 livestock farmers were vaccinated and treated while 417 extension sessions were held with the livestock owners.
- **Distribution of seeds:** 220 families in Eldain locality, South Darfur received vegetable seeds as well as support in the form of veterinary checks for livestock in collaboration with the Ministry of Animal Resources.
- **Support to farmers groups:** 17,207 kilogrammes of assorted crop and vegetable seeds were distributed to 27 farmers groups and 11 teachers groups across 9 villages in Blue Nile state. Additionally, 50 families in Dereng Nomads village in Bau locality received support in the form of goats.



#### WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

- **Safe water:** 130,000 internally displaced persons in Kass and Otash IDP camps, as well as host communities members Kubum and Nitaga in South Darfur are accessing clean water daily from improved water sources supported by World Vision such as hand pump rehabilitation, and upgrading of water pumps.
- **Sanitation:** 1,350 people in Kass and Nitaga localities have access to latrines after communities were supported to construct both household and communal latrines in Kass and Nitaga localities.
- **Hygiene:** Hygiene and sanitation behavioural change campaigns conducted for at least 21,000 people in South Darfur state and across seven villages in three localities, Giessan, Kurmuk locality and Bau localities in Blue Nile states.



#### HEALTH & NUTRITION

- **Health facilities:** 10,846 accessed in Blue Nile and South Darfur states received free Primary Health Care (PHC) package across 12 clinics supported by World Vision. Some of the services were vaccination for 3,495 children and women were as part of the Expanded Programme on Immunization (EPI); and reproductive health services for 1,269 women and girls, free medical consultation, free delivery by skilled attendants, and treatment of common illnesses such as malaria, diarrhea and skin infections.
- **Nutrition:** World Vision supported 45 nutrition centres providing Outpatient Therapeutic Programmes (OTP) and management of acute malnutrition with complications across 15 localities in Blue Nile and South Darfur states.



#### FOOD ASSISTANCE

- **Food commodities:** 126,276 IDPs in Nyala, Kass Mershing, Kass and Otash camps in South Darfur state received food commodities through the General Food Distribution (GFD) programme.
- **Cash Based Transfer:** 76,280 most vulnerable people in Otash and Dereige IDP camps received assistance under the Cash Based Transfer (CBT) program. Each person received US\$7.



#### EDUCATION

**Support for school children:** 10,072 children across 10 primary schools received monthly mid-day meals, under World Vision's school meal project, which contributed to their stay in school. In the same schools World Vision promoted the initiatives of vegetable gardens.



#### PROTECTION

**Child Friendly Spaces:** 1,437 children in South Darfur state attended World Vision Child Friendly Spaces where they participated in learning and recreational activities.

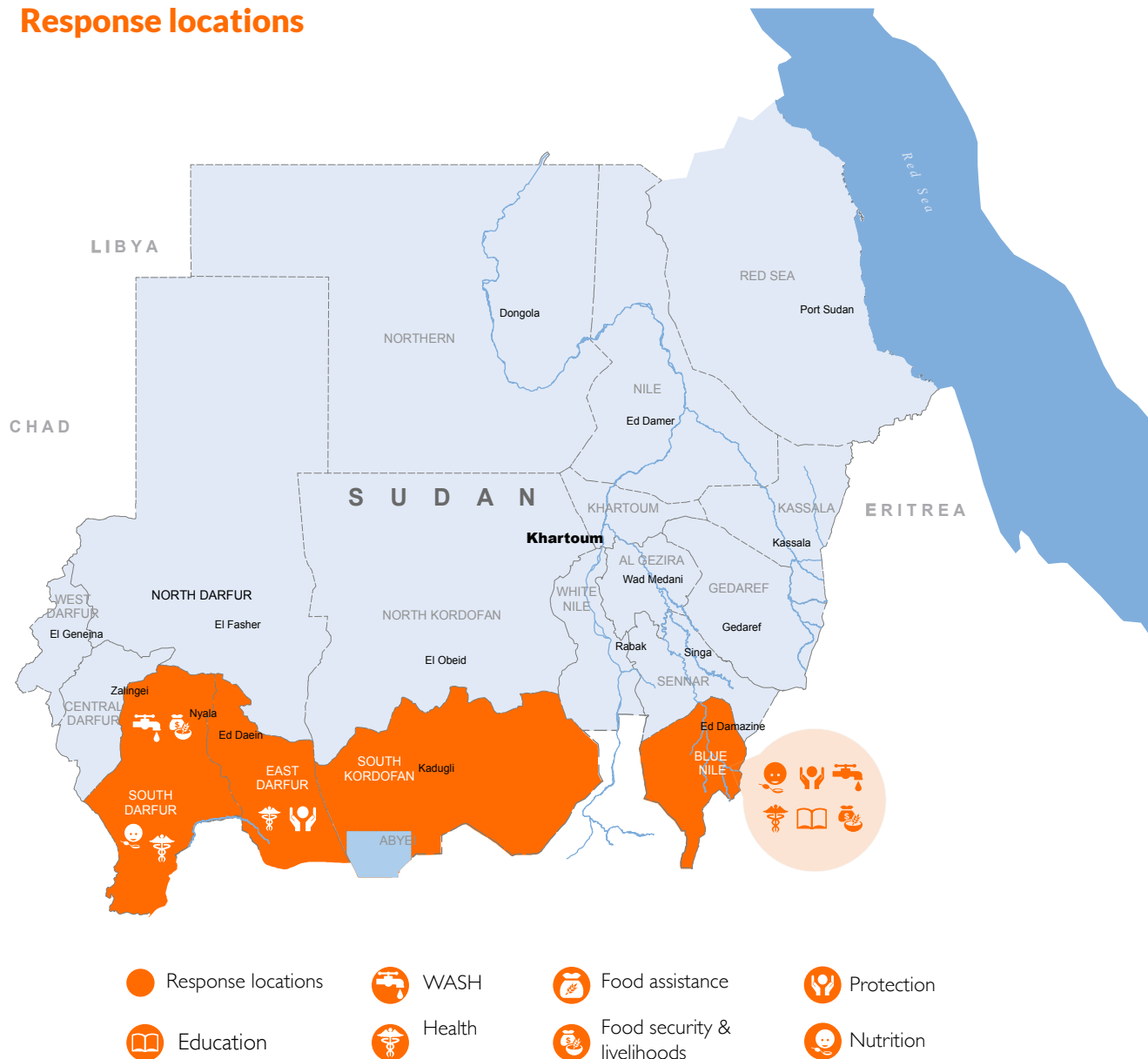
