

SYRIA



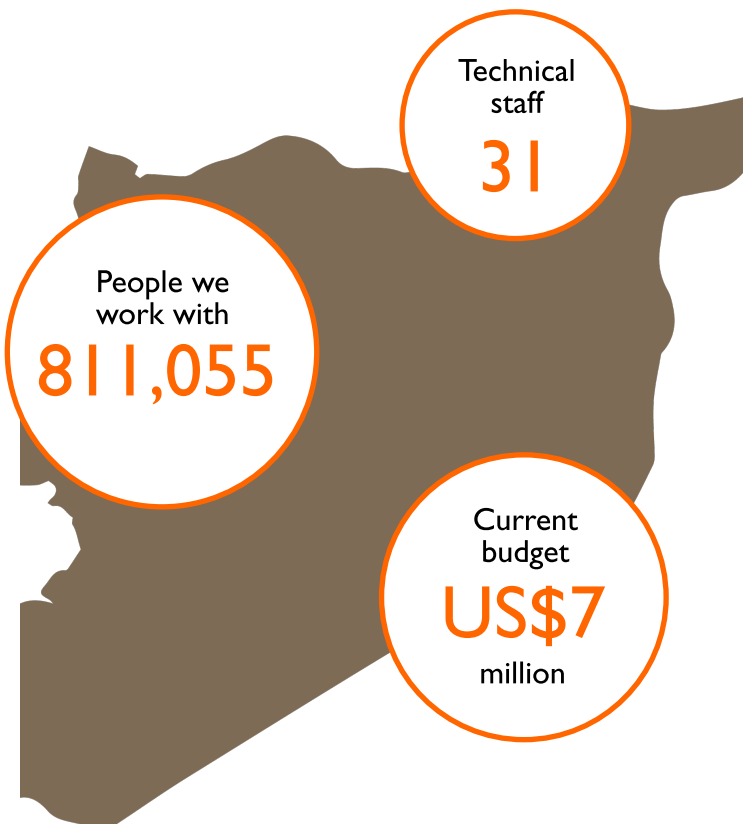
Since the beginning of the crisis in 2011, Syria has witnessed significant challenges in the humanitarian and security situation across the country, an increase in the targeting of civilian infrastructure and a marked increase in internal displacement. Human rights violations and abuse occur in the context of widespread insecurity and disregard for the international humanitarian law standards.

An estimated 13.5 million people, including six million children are in need of some form of humanitarian assistance and protection. 6.5 million people, including 2.8 million children, are displaced within Syria and 4.2 million are registered refugees in neighboring countries and North Africa. On average, since 2011, 50 Syrian families have been displaced every hour of every day. The pace of displacement remains relentless. Over 1.2 million people have been displaced this year, many for the second or third time. Increasing numbers of civilians are fleeing and are prepared to risk their lives to reach Europe.

WATER, SANITATION & HYGIENE

The WASH programme is contributing to the following four key outcomes defined by Syria's 'WASH Sector Working Group':

1. To increase access to safe drinking water for all internally displaced people and affected people in World Vision operation areas.
2. To increase access to improved sanitation services for all internally displaced and affected people in World Vision operation areas.
3. Improve solid waste management (collection and disposal).
4. All target populations are aware of key public health risks and adopt good hygiene practices.
